A DEMORALIZED PARTY.

It must be evident to Leader Murray that the introduction of his amendment to the Address in the Legislature recommending an increase in the rate of stumpage, was exceedingly bad tactics from a party standpoint. The amendment will serve no good purpose other than to reveal to the public the weakness and demoralized condition of the party which Mr. Murray has the doubtful honor of leading. While it is the duty of an opposition to criticize the administration, its criticism should be of a constructive nature, and if a leader is possessed of tact and judgment he will so far as possible avoid challenging a division when it is likely to disclose a difference of opinion among his own followers. Mr. Murray would have been well advised had he left the stumpage question for the government to deal with, but he failed to do so, and must now take the consequences of his rather foolhardy action. It is said now that in proposing the amendment he acted on the advice of Mr. B. Frank Smith, a politician with a grouse, and did not deem it worth while to take his more level-headed supporters into his confidence. Proof that he adopted this course was furnished yesterday when two of his colleagues who have previously given him staunch support, arose in the Legislature and announced that they would be unable to support the amendment introduced by their leader. It is said that several other opposition members are wavering on the question and it is doubtful if more than a baker's dozen will rally to the support of the amendment.

The trouble with the loyal opposition is that it has been shot to pieces by a series of disgraceful scandals which so blackened the good name of the province while some of its leading men were in control of the government. There is no cohesion in the party and its every move is looked upon with suspicion by a discerning public. The leading lights of the party squabbled among themselves when in power and they are doing the same thing today as they sit in the cool shades of opposition. The combination at the left of the Speaker does not contain the elements which make a party great, and the people having in mind its administrative record, will be scarcely likely to entrust it with the task of carrying on the affairs of the country. The opposition has got to be born again before it expects the people of this province to take it seriously.

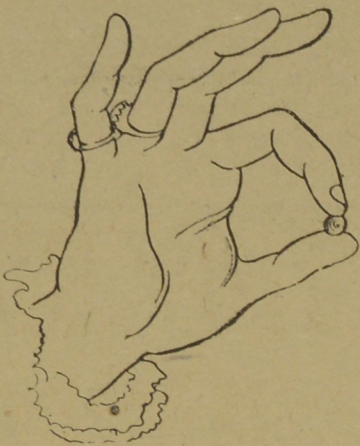
As Premier Foster pointed out in his able speech on the Address, all the money which has been expended by the present government in providing permanent roads has been provided from the tax on motor vehicles. This policy was adopted by the government when it came into power in compliance with a pledge it made when in opposition. The old government collected a tax on motor vehicles, but did not spend the money on the roads.

Leader Murray's amendment to the Address was brought forward with the object of catching the votes of the organized farmers of the province. But strange to say, the only one of Mr. Murray's legislative supporters who has been mentioned as a probable U.

also indulged in criticism of the government. In regard to the Health Act he said that he believed that with some amendments which would make it more effective and less expensive it might be made to work out all right. In regard to the stumpage rate he had given the matter careful consideration and had arrived at the conclusion that he could not support the amendment of his leader. Mr. Smith was applauded by both side of the House when he resumed his seat.

Some Hot Shot

Hon. Mr. Veniot then took the floor and was not long in injecting some life into the debate. He twitted the opposition on their lack of harmony and expressed sympathy with Leader Murray on being surrounded with colleagues in whom he had no confidence. He also went after the opposition leader for his action in assisting to pass an order in council fixing the rate of stumpage for ten years at \$1.50 per thousand. The Minister described it as a fraudulent transaction given as a quid pro quo for a bundle fund of \$115,000 extracted from the lumbermen by a former premier. He said that the lumbermen met on April 1st 1914, and compelled the then premier to make good his promise to fix the rate. "It was April Fool's day" quoth Hon. Mr. Veniot "and the day was well chosen." The Minister took issue with Mr. Murray's statement regarding the cost of manufacturing lumber and pointed out that on the North Shore expenses were much higher than in other parts of the province. For instance it cost as high as \$65 and \$70 to portage a ton of hay into the woods which brought the cost of that commodity up to \$100 per ton. He also pointed out that laths fluctuated in price and the profit was not nearly so great as the opposition leader had stated.

Hon. Mr. Veniot moved the adjournment of the debate and has the floor this afternoon.
