## EIGHT HOUR DAY FOR FARMERS SUGGESTED FOR COMMISSION

The passing of resolutions was an important part of Wednesday night's session of the Farmers' and Dairy-men's Association of New Brunswick. Chief among the resolutions passed was one calling upon the Provincial Government to appoint a commission to investigate the cost of farm products on the basis of an eight-hour day with a fair profit added to cost of production. Another important resolution was for the establishment of cold storage, stockyards and an abattoir at some central point to be selected. A committee to go to Ottawa to press this matter was selected.

The present meeting of the Farmers and Dairy-men's Association is the first at which the program has been interspersed with musical and other numbers. The innovation is greatly appreciated by the Association members. Last night there were readings by Miss Giberson of the Normal School Staff and solos by Miss Hazel McCain and R. B. Flewelling and A. C. Gorham of the Dept. of Agriculture.

### Resolutions Passed

A resolution asking the Dominion Government to establish an abattoir, cold storage and stockyards at some point yet to be determined, in the Maritime Provinces was passed after long discussion by A. E. Trites of Salisbury and R. M. Bynon of Harrisville. Hon. J. F. Tweeddale, J. D. McKenna of Sussex, Mr. Bynon and Mr. Trites were appointed a delegation to go to Ottawa on this matter.

A resolution in favor of underdrainage of land and asking for the Dept. of Agriculture to supply clay tile for distribution by Agricultural Societies was passed.

### North Shore Experimental Station

The following resolution was passed. That this convention submit to the Federal Dept. of Agriculture the advantage of establishing an Experimental Station on the North Shore.

The following resolution was also passed: That we request that a delegation be appointed to wait upon the government and urge upon them the necessity of immediately inserting in the curriculum of our country schools such a text book on Elementary Agriculture as shall enable the pupils at least by the time they have reached the fifth grade, to know what each of the various products or plants grown on the farm draws from the soil and also the need and value of the fertilizer required to make the growing of that plant a success.

R. M. Bynon, A. C. Gorham and M. A. McLeod all spoke to the resolution. A resolution was introduced by a French member that no meetings be

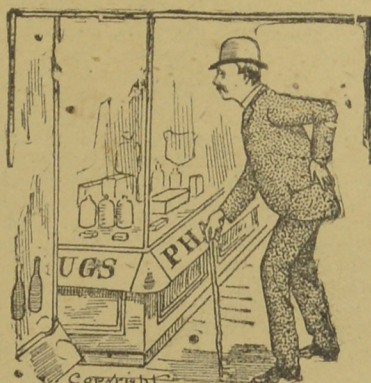

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held in future during the week of St. Patrick's Day.

Rev. Father Delagarde of Nash's Creek spoke in favor of the resolution.

On amendment the matter was left to the executive.

On motion it was decided to send the minutes of the convention to the secretaries of all Agricultural Societies.

### Egg Laying and Poultry

The following resolution was passed unanimously: That this convention take up the matter of egg laying contests with the proper authorities with a view of obtaining an egg-laying contest at the Experimental Station at Fredericton beginning November 1st, 1920.

A resolution placing the Association on record as recommending that poultry be marketed undrawn with heads and feet attached was passed.

### Eight Hour Day

The following resolution moved by T. A. Goggin and seconded by J. R. Taylor was passed without discussion.

Whereas the cost of all farm produce is considered by the city consumers to be too high, and whereas the farmer is entitled to the current rate of pay for his labor,

Resolved that this Farmers' and Dairy-men's Convention now assembled request the Provincial Government to appoint a commission to ascertain the actual cost of farm produce on the basis of an eight-hour day, plus a reasonable profit, the report of the commission to be published in all local papers and also in pamphlet form.

### Community Social Centres

The passing of resolutions was followed by a most interesting paper by Rev. R. A. Robinson of Stanley upon Community Social Centres. The speaker dwelt upon the importance of developing a community spirit in view of the marked unrest which appears everywhere in the world. Rural districts would to a great measure escape that unrest but it could not be expected that they would wholly escape. In the United States Community Social Centres had been recognized by State legislation. The same was to some extent in Ontario although the Americans had developed this movement to its greater extent.

In many communities the public school buildings were those best adapted for use as social centres. The necessity of making some attempt to interest the young people in the life of a rural community was plain to all. It frequently was urged that certain subjects could not be discussed in general gatherings such as would take place at a community centre. Politics and religion were the chief ones yet why could it not be that a proper spirit would be so developed that such subjects could be discussed fairly and without heat and passion. In Stanley Rev. Mr. Robinson said, there was a building well adapted for use as a community centre but he feared it was not sufficiently used.

### Cooperative Marketing

The latter part of the meeting was taken up by discussion on Cooperative Marketing of wool, lambs and other live stock. Those who took part were J. K. King and Robert Donaldson of Moncton, representatives of the Dominion Live Stock Division, and F. W. Walsh of Fredericton, Acting Live Stock Supt. for the Provincial Agricultural Dept. Motion pictures were used to illustrate the subject.

### Wednesday Afternoon

Potato Sprays and Spraying was the subject of an interesting discussion Wednesday afternoon, George E. Sanders of Annapolis Royal, N. S. officer in charge of the Dominion Entomological Laboratory there, was the chief speaker. E. P. Bradt, Deputy Minister of Agriculture also spoke along general lines and M. Tardiff, assistant in Potato Diseases Inspection delivered an address in French.

### Successful Services

The Forward Movement Evangelistic Campaign at the George Street Baptist Church showed progress last night and increased attendance. Rev. H. H. Ferguson preached a searching sermon on the privilege that everyone has of becoming a Christian and the responsibility for not accepting. New decisions were made in the after-meeting conducted by the Pastor Rev. Z. L. Fash. The Lelong quartette sang two selections. The rousing congregational singing from the Billy Sunday Hymn Books is conducted by R. H. Wickett who has entire charge of the musical arrangements of the campaign.
