CORRCT USE OF

Are you quite sure that you know the correct way to use your electric ron? It seems and it is simple enough matter to attach an electric flatiron for service; but in this as in everything else there is a right way of doing it.

For quick, light work, such as the smoothing of a single blouse or a few handkerchiefs, it is permissable to screw the plug into any convenient lighting socket; indeed, one of the great advantages of the electric iron is that it can be used in any desired room or even on the porch in summer with absolute safety and satisfaction.

But for the regular ironing it is more convenient and the cord will last longer, if provisions are made for suspending the cord upon a light coil spring. Such springs can be purchased at any hardware store for a few as may be otherwise directed.
