ELECTION TALK IS HEAD AT THE FEDERAL CAPITAL

If By-elections Result Favorably the Government May Soon Take Plunge --- Missionaries Have Been Sowing Seed in the West --- Much Talk and Rustle in the Political Hedges--- Government's Original Plan was to Hold Off.

Ottawa, Nov. 16—Is there going to be a general election this coming winter? There is not much here, so far, by way of conclusive indication and Hon. Mr. Meighen's Brandon utterance might be construed to the contrary, but preparations are being made that would serve as good a purpose this winter as two years hence. Many are coming to the belief that the election report may contain more of truth than of fiction. The missionaries to the west are about to return after sowing seed and carrying on what the agile Mr. Calder has described as a campaign of education. The same oracle declared recently when heckled to bring on an election that one may come before some people expect it. All this talk and rustle in the political hedges lead many politicians to believe that an election may well be in the offing even if it is not decided.

There is no question but that the plan of the government has been to hold till 1922, or in other words to the last limit of their constitutional tenure giving as the justification the need of a redistribution bill to provide the

TO CHECK THE SLAUGHTER OF ELEPHANTS

London, Nov. 6—Sentence of death on elephants and other big and small game is now being carried out in two areas within the Union of South Africa.

This slaughter is being strongly resisted by South African naturalists and scientists.

A. K. Haagner, director of the Pretoria Zoological Gardens, who has enlisted much practical sympathy for the victims here and in the United States has just reached London. "The one herd of elephants in the Union of South Africa," he said yesterday, "in the Addo Bush, near Port Elizabeth, was ordered to be wiped out because they damaged crops. We protested, and the Cape Provincial Council promised to spare sixteen animals only. When I left 88 elephants had been shot already.

"In another area (in Zululand) the Natal Provincial Council has ordered the extermination of game because it was believed that these animals played a part in the life-cycle of the Tsetse fly, which infects cattle with the terrible 'Nagana' disease (a scourge allied to sleeping sickness in man).

"After this edict 8000 zebra hides came down for export, and the brindled gnu, koodoo, wildebeeste, rhinoceros, buffalo, and others are on the condemned list.

"The maddening part of it is this, that the recent researches throw the gravest doubt on the part alleged to be played by game in spreading Nagana."

west with its proper representation and accomplish other things. Where political expediency is the governing factor western representation, or any other obstacle would not stand in the way for a minute, should the government think the present a judicious and salutary time to take the plunge.

National Outlook

If the national outlook were the most optimistic, the situation would be different but such is hardly the case. Many cities report much unemployment and the distressing features that go with it. Toronto is wiring the premier as to the serious aspect of the situation there and Montreal is about the same. In the west there is difficulty and dissatisfaction over the price and marketing of wheat and a really serious situation is threatened if the incoming Republican administration across the border removes reciprocity from the statute book and does away with the free market for Canadian wheat and cattle. It has an excuse in the fact that reciprocity has been rejected here and the political propaganda now underway is not at all neighborly. If the government comes to the conclusion that country is in for a period of depressed conditions and that the situation, instead of improving before a general election may get worse there are some in it who would favor taking the bull by the horns and going to the people with all due expedition. A government is never without an excuse and in this case an election anyway would only meet a general and insistent demand.

By Elections

Next week's by-elections if they go favorably, may be construed fully as much as an encouragement to "go the whole hog" and face the electorate as to hold on till the limit of parliament is reached. After all, things are pretty nearly ready for an election. The new franchise act is in operation, the new premier has got in touch with every part of the country, the organization has been tuned up and a powerful and ominous propaganda is being staged. There is a promise to revise the tariff. What lines to follow in doing it would be a perfectly good pretext upon which to seek electoral direction and there is the ever present consideration that dissolution is overdue. In deciding the matter the government can be relied upon to do what it considers as best in its own interest. The course to be pursued will be that which appears most consistent with political safety.
