COMPULSION SHOULD
APPLY UP TO SIXTEEN

A. W. French of St. John Elect-
ed Chairman of Sub-Prop.

Resolutions.

The Sub-Provincial Board of the Brotherhood of Railway Trainmen which has been holding its session in the Oldfellows' Hall elected officers at a session held here yesterday afternoon. The officers are:

Compulsory Education.
An important resolution which was passed was relative to compulsory education in the Province of New Brunswick. The resolution required the age for leaving school to be changed from fourteen to sixteen and called for the appointment of more truancy officers. This will be laid before the Provincial Legislature at its next session by the Legislation Committee which is composed of the officers.

A resolution on safety appliances which was passed will be placed before the Dominion Executive.
The matter of a forty-eight hour week was not discussed being outside the sphere of the board.
There also was a resolution in favor of increasing the amount to be exempt under the Income Tax Law, by five hundred dollars.
Another resolution favored the abolition of the Luxury Tax.

In the case against Guy Anderson charged with resisting arrest, His Honor Police Magistrate Limerick this morning postponed judgment.

The total number of paid admissions at the last Woodstock exhibition as shown by a return made at the annual meeting of the Agricultural Society last week, was 19,337. The receipts from the sale of tickets amounted to \$12,162.88.

The McGill Fund
Mr. Charles E. Neill general manager of the Royal Bank of Canada, and son of Mr. J. S. Neill of this city has contributed \$10,000 to the endowment fund of McGill University. Of the \$5,000,000 which it is proposed to raise about \$2,000,000 has been subscribed.

A wedding of interest was solemnized at nine o'clock this morning at St. Anthony's Church, Devon, when Rev. E. J. Conway united in marriage J. Edward McCloskey of Barker's Point and Miss Mina M. Goodine of Kingsclear. Nuptial mass was celebrated. The witnesses were William McCloskey brother of the groom and Miss Louise Goodine of Kingsclear, sister of the bride. Mr. and Mrs. McCloskey will reside at Barker's Point.

Mill Shut Down.
The River Valley Lumber Company's saw mill at Oromocto was shut down on Saturday after a successful season's work. The company has a large quantity of logs left over and will hold them in the Oromocto River until next season. Lumbering operations during the coming winter will be greatly curtailed. It is the intention of the company to operate a camp at The Barony, York County, on land purchased from Ex-Warden John Scott of this city.

Bread Cheaper.
St. John Globe: Bread dropped one cent, wholesale, on Monday, with a like drop in price by retailers. The wholesale price is now fourteen cents while the retailers sell at from fifteen to sixteen cents. The difference in retail prices is due to the fact that while some retailers are willing to sell at one cent over the wholesale price, others believe that a two cent gross profit is a fair margin. This condition prevails in all sections of the city.

Increased Stipends.
A meeting of the sub-committee of missions of the Fredericton diocesan synod was held yesterday in the Church of England Institute at St. John with his lordship Bishop Richardson presiding. The business of the meeting was concerned with matters in connection with the allotment of increased stipends for the mission clergy. The increase was previously granted by the synod and is to be effective from January 1. Ven. Archdeacon Newnham, of St. Stephen, is the secretary of the sub-committee.

Died in Boston.
Mrs. Theresa Macomber wife of Jehu M. Macomber, died Saturday at Boston after an illness with pneumonia. The deceased was aged fifty-eight years. She was a daughter of Elisha Nevers of Prince William. Surviving relatives are one brother Clowes Nevers of Prince William and two sisters Mrs. Robert Long of Kingsclear and Mrs. John Kelley of Lake George. The remains arrived here today by C. P. R. They will be taken to Long's Creek by C. N. R. this evening. The funeral will take place at ten o'clock Thursday morning from the home of Clowes Nevers, Kingsclear. Rev. Mr. Swin will conduct the services and interment will be made at Long's Creek Burying Ground.

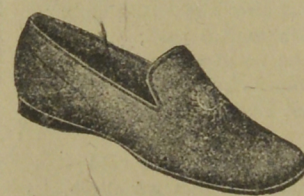
