U. N. B. WENT DOWN BEFORE ACADIA; SCORE 8 TO 5

Western Intercollegiate Hockey League Tied—A Play-off is Necessary—Acadia Took Lead of Three Points in First Period and Finished With It—Supporters of U. N. B. Team Greatly Disappointed.

Overconfidence and absence of effective substitutes made the University of New Brunswick candidate for a playoff in the Western Intercollegiate Hockey League with a first class chance of being beaten out. Acadia won the final scheduled game of the league 8 to 5 at the Arctic Rink Thursday night. The result was nothing like what nine out of every ten of the twelve hundred spectators expected. U. N. B. was leading the league with three victories and no losses and two of the wins away from home. Having defeated Acadia at Wolfville even by the narrow margin of 3 to 2 the Red and Black was expected to repeat.

Much money was put up on U. N. B. and many now are of the opinion that hockey should be classed among the uncertain sports such as politics and horse racing.

U. N. B. Has Been Better

The U. N. B. team has played better hockey than it did last night. One outstanding fact was that those in charge of the squad did not believe that they had a substitute who could class with the brand of hockey played by Lindsay relieved Burgess for about two minutes. Except for that, the original U. N. B. sextette played the full three periods. Against them they had nine Acadia men who were substituted when needed, and they were needed, for the pace was such that many had the signals of distress hanging out. The U. N. B. forwards worked hard but the defence was not on to its job. Time and time again three and sometimes four Acadia men would comedown on the U. N. B. net with no one in front of them but McKenzie the goal-keeper. At that he saved goals repeatedly but sometimes went out of his net with disastrous results. In the first period U. N. B. showed only too plainly the effects of overconfidence and ended the period on the little end of a 4 to 1 score. The second period the U. N. B. made its own and came within one of tying the score. The third period saw the Red and Black fighting hard but unsuccessfully for a goal. Acadia tallied first and that finished things. It was 8 to 4 against the Red and Black before the local team rallied. It was then too late and one goal from a mixup was all it got. In the first period particularly U. N. B. tried combination when hard individual play would have been better. The play looked pretty but netted no goals.

Acadia Dug in All the Time

Acadia won largely by digging in at all times and taking advantage of every opportunity which presented itself. This was very noticeable in the first period when the Red and Blue ran in four goals by every player going through when he could and slamming the puck as hard as he could. This beat McKenzie out sufficiently to give the lead which won the match. The judicious use of subs also helped the Wolfville team. In the net Steves played well but probably did not on the whole do as well as did McKenzie. The pace told on Acadia and the performance of the U. N. B. team to last the match with practically no substitution was little short of wonderful.

The Game

Play began with U. N. B. supporters confident. This confidence seemed to be well placed when Bill Lounsbury scored within a few minutes. Five minutes later it looked as if something was wrong for Acadia started scoring and kept right at it. Some of these goals looked ludicrously easy, for the Red and Blue forwards would get inside the U. N. B. defence.

The second period began with the U. N. B. people still confident of their team's ability to win out. It looked as if this was justified for U. N. B. certainly outplayed Acadia, scoring three goals to one and the team from Wolfville looked very much like blowing up.

With a one-point lead Acadia fought hard in the last period for there was no scoring for thirteen minutes. Then it was Acadia which did it. It was almost a repetition of the first period. U. N. B. was a beaten team. The only flash was late in the period when the Red and Black drove in a fierce attack which netted one goal which Flett drove in from a mix-up.

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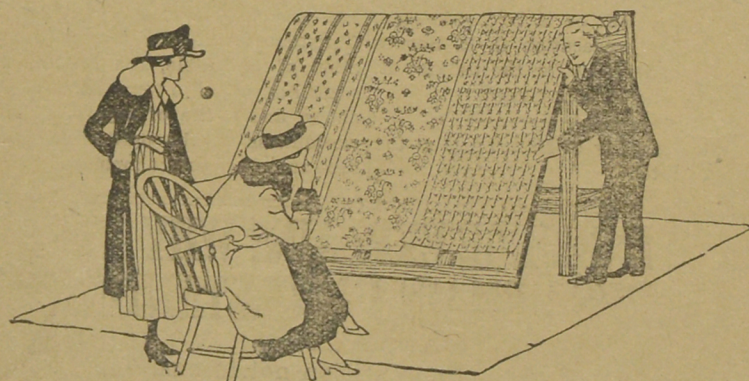
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
