SMALL HEN HOUSES ARE

The size of the hen house should be governed by the size of the flock. From forty to fifty seems to be abou as many birds as are safe to keep together. With flocks of this size from four to five square feet of floor space should be allowed to each bird. This space will suffice in most cases where careful attention is given to cleanliness and ventilation. If the fowls are kept in smaller flocks more floor space, to a bird will be needed.

In sections where the climate is so mild that it is unnecessary to keep fowls confined, except for a few days at a time, less space to a bird should be sufficient. The smaller breeds, being more active and restless, require about as much room as the larger breeds.

For the greatest amount of floor space for the least cost a building should be square. Other things bein equal the nearer square a house is th less lumber it will take. However, it is sometimes out of the question to build a large house square. A building should not be so wide that the sun cannot reach the back of the house; otherwise it will be damp. Fourteen fet is a convenient width. Build the house as low as possible without danger or attendants bumping their heads against the ceiling, for the low house is more easily warmed than a high one
