

## DALHOUSIE GIVEN GREAT NAME BY POST

Cape Bretoners Impressed by College Hockey Team from Halifax—Hump Campbell's Work.

The Sydney Post in its report of the Glace Bay-Dalhousie hockey game, says:

The Dal team showed a surprising reversal of form and were fifty per cent. stronger than they were against Sydney. In fact they didn't look like the same team. They beat a wonderful hockey team on Saturday night, perhaps as strong an aggregation as could have been got together in this part of the province.

The bright outstanding player of the game, however, was a native son, Steve McIsaac, the greatest goaler in Eastern Canada. To McIsaac more than any other player must go the laurels for Saturday night's win.

McIsaac's work was about as nifty as anything seen in these parts in years. In fact Dal. excelled on the defensive play. When he played in Sydney Fluck didn't look like the star he was touted but at Glace Bay he played a whole of a game, his blocking being one of the features. Not only did Fluck play a strong defense game, but in the early stages of the pastime he uncorked several end-to-end rushes that were effective and kept Glace Bay on the defensive at a time when they should have been getting a commanding lead.

Fluck in the form he displayed at Glace Bay on Saturday night demonstrated that before the 1920 season draws to a close he will be one of the stars of a team that in college hockey should rank far and above anything of its kind ever seen in the Maritime Provinces.

Jack I. McNeill blocked as only McNeill can block and showed hockey followers who attended the game that as a defence player he has few equals in the Maritime Provinces. The Dal defence is one that can fit in any class of hockey being played in the provinces.

Lilly took the honors of the line. This boy is fast a tireless worker, and is a star in the making. He outplayed the veteran Jimmy Fraser, and was the most troublesome player of the Dal forwards. Steve McIsaac gave Lilly valuable assistance.

Dal has in charge of them the peer of athletic coaches of Eastern Canada "Hump" Campbell. Campbell is just the man to handle the Dal Hockey team, and within three weeks' time he will have a well oiled machine that should cop all the collegiate honors in 1920.


