How an English naval officer in Libau acquired a luxurious mahogany furnished private yacht in exchange for two cases of toilet soap was told by Lieut. E. Messenger, until recently in charge of children's relief work in Lithuania for the American Relief Association.

"Soap is so scarce throughout Eastern Europe," declared Lieut. Messenger in a report made to Col. Harry Cutler of the American Jewish Relief Committee, "that this English naval officer found himself the most sought after man in Libau when it was discovered that he had a small quantity of soap."

"One of the wealthiest citizens in Libau, with plenty of the luxuries of life but none of the necessities, finally got two cases of soap in exchange for his private yacht."

## FRED McLEAN SHAPED LIKE FIND IN N.H.L.

Fredericton Hockeyist Who Has Starred in Cape Breton Making Good With Quebec.

Fred McLean, formerly of Fredericton who has starred in Cape Breton professional hockey for some years, evidently has made good with the Quebec Club of the National Hockey League. Last Wednesday Quebec was beaten at Ottawa. McLean was used. This is how the Montreal Star sized up the Quebec players:

## ANTIPODES PRODUCE A BOY WONDER

New York, Feb. 21—Australia has an out-and-out boy wonder for the sprints, and if reports from the land of the kangaroo prove to be reliable, the new aspirant for fame is bound to startle the universe. His name is P. J. Heath. In the Australian inter-scholastic championships recently he succeeded in covering the 100 yards in 10 seconds, really wonderful time for a school boy.

The style in which the youngster scored his victory was most striking. At sixty yards he had the field so well in hand that he dropped his arms and won easily by more than three yards, and a few of those who had watches that registered "tenths" of a second claimed that Heath showed better than "Evens" for the century.

As to the method of getting over the ground it is said that the youthful kangaroo leaves nothing to be desired. A powerfully-built chap and strides long and low, thereby losing very little energy reaching for the stride.

According to the sporting exchanges from the "land down below," Heath already is assured a place on the Australian team, which will compete in the Olympic Games in Belgium next August. He belongs to the same family as "Red" W. Heath, a Davis Cup lawn tennis player.

## THE HENS MAY BE TOO OLD

There are people who have the right variety of fowls who house and feed them properly, and yet who can not obtain eggs early in the winter because the fowls are too old. It seldom pays to keep hen for laying after they are 2½ years old; not that they will not give a profit, but that younger fowls will give a greater profit. A great many poultrymen who make a specialty of egg production, keep nothing but pullets, disposing of the 1-year-old hens before it is time to put them in winter quarters. The champion of the girls' poultry clubs of Mississippi keeps nothing but pullets.

Early hatched pullets if properly grown ought to begin laying in October or early November and continue to lay through the winter. Yearling hens seldom begin laying much before January 1 and older hens not until later. It is the November and December eggs that bring the high prices. The laying breeds should begin laying when about 5 to 6 months old, general purpose breeds at 6 to 7 months, and the meat breeds at 8 to 9 months.

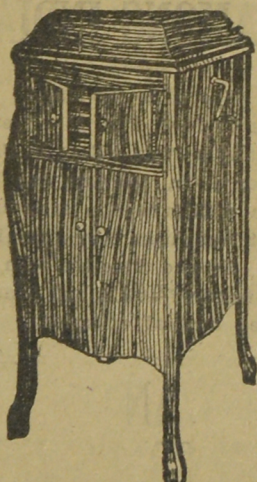

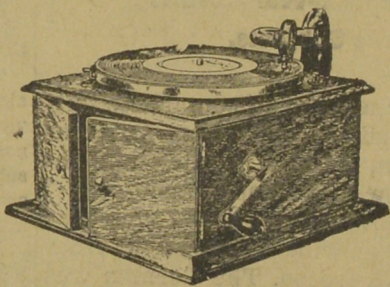
