CRITICISM DIRECTED AGAINST SOLDIERS' SETTLEMENT BOARD

Major C. G. Power the Chief Critic—Montreal Great War Veterans' Association Has Demanded Reorganization of the Board—Hon. Arthur Meighen Defended the Board and Explained its Work—Fifty Millions Wanted.

Ottawa, May 7—Accomplishments to date under the soldiers' settlement act and the work of the soldiers' settlement board were debated in the house today. The discussion arose when the house went into committee of supply on a vote of fifty million dollars to provide for a continuance of this work. Hon. Arthur Meighen under whom the board functions, opened the debate by giving to the committee a review of the work accomplished. He said that the amount of loans approved from the time the scheme was put in operation until the end of last march, totalled nearly sixty millions. Fifty thousand applications had been received, more than 36,000 had been approved, and 15,234 settlers were now on the land through the assistance of the government. The average loan per settler was \$3,700 and already sixty-nine applicants had discharged their obligations in full.

Hon. Mr. Meighen said that all but two millions of the amount asked for would be advanced in loans, the remaining two million being required for administration purposes. The work of the home branch in assisting the wives of the soldier settlers was proceeding in a satisfactory manner and was being extended gradually to all the provinces.

Some Criticism

Although the majority of the committee appeared pleased with the accomplishments and paid tribute to the work of the board a certain amount of criticism was offered before the committee rose to allow for the presentation of the report on scientific industrial research. Major C. G. Power Quebec South, expressed the opinion that the chairman of the board should be a returned soldier and he objected to settlers using the land for speculative purposes. He also said that the Great War Veterans' Association in convention at Montreal had passed a resolution demanding the reorganization of the board. Mr. Meighen replied that the reorganization requested in the resolution was underway when the resolution was moved, and that it had resulted in the discharge of Mr. Dace, of Edmonton, the mover of the resolution. This man had been in the employ of the board but it was found that he was using his position to further his private ends.

An Independent Body

Major Power however took the ground that it was unfair to dismiss a resolution passed by such an independent body as the G. W. V. A. in a convention where possibly three hundred thousand returned soldiers were represented. The minister had no right to insinuate that because two or three men had a personal grievance they

were able to dragoon a whole convention.

The minister of the interior said that he would not be justified in acting on resolutions unsupported by facts. He must have a citation of actual cases before he would be justified in acting. He could not see that any gain would result from discussing resolutions. It was finally agreed at the request of Major Power that several resolutions dealing with the working of the soldiers' settlement act and passed by returned soldiers' organizations should be brought before the committee now sitting on reestablishment.

At the opening of the house Sir George Foster said that the budget would be brought down on Wednesday. He also confirmed the report that the prime minister is on his way home.

SOME HINTS ON SPRAYING FRUIT TREES

(Experimental Farms Note.)

If the fruit grower, vegetable grower or flower grower does not spray nowadays, he is almost certain to have inferior products in his orchard, small fruit plantation and garden. There are so many injurious insects and diseases which affect a large proportion of the plants he grows that if they are uncontrolled there will either be no crop left or else the value of the crop will be very much reduced.

There are few of these insects and diseases which cannot be well controlled by using some of the remedies which have been discovered during the past twenty-five or thirty years and which have been well tested by many experiments.

Spraying must however, be thoroughly done if good results are to be obtained. Materials are expensive, and the cost of labour is not done at the right time.

The early sprayings are, as a rule, the most important, and those who contemplate spraying as all should who have orchards or gardens, should get everything in readiness to begin at the right time as delay may mean much loss. Spray Calendars are issued by the Dominion and Provincial Departments of Agriculture, in which several sprayings are recommended to be applied at certain stages in the development of the leaves, flowers, and fruit. In the case of fruit trees the spray should be applied so that every leaf, bud, and fruit will, if possible, receive some of the material, not only on one part of it but as nearly all over as possible. Every leaf flower and bud or young fruit missed means a possible starting point for disease or insect pests. In the case of vegetables promptness in the application of a good spray is just as important as with fruits. One does not need to be convinced of the value of promptness in using poison in controlling the Colorado potato beetle as the results of the spray are immediately apparent in the death of the "bugs", but more faith is required when dealing with diseases and insects which are not so readily seen but which do much harm, and usually the grower is well rewarded for such faith.

The formulae for the mixtures and solutions recommended should be followed as closely as possible. If a man knows the chemical composition of the materials he uses, and has made a study of spraying, he may alter them slightly to meet certain circumstances, but if he knows little about them he should follow closely the instructions given on the Spray Calendar. He should, also spray as nearly as possible at the time suggested. A delay of a few days may mean practically the loss of the mixture or solution used as there might be no return for the labour and expense.
