AROUND THE CITY

The School Board has advertised for a male teacher to be principal of Smythe street School. Time was when all the graded schools of Fredericton had male principals. Now the Regent street School and the Model School are the only ones with men at the head. Does the advertisement mean that there will be return to former conditions? Does the intimation made while the Teachers' Salaries Bill was under discussion in the Legislature, that there should be equal pay for equal work, have another side to it? Is it possible that efforts will be made to attract men to the teaching profession? To the minds of many it will be step in the right direction to have male principals in the graded schools.

The stone retaining wall along Queen street in front of the Officers' Square is leaning toward the square and in time will fall. The street at that particular point has been built up several feet and that fact accounts for the leaning of the wall. Marked changes have taken place in the level of streets and other pieces of land in Fredericton in comparatively short periods. The big freshet of 1887 flooded the Officers' Square deep enough to float a canoe and the sidewalk of Queen street then was not more than a foot above the level of the square. At the same time the approach to the highway bridge was so low that carriages passed through water to reach the bridge. Brunswick street in that memorable spring was flooded several feet deep in places. Since then it has been built up some feet.

The big freshet came not many years after the erection of the highway bridge here. "Blair's Paper Bridge" it was called by political opponents of the late Hon. A. G. Blair, premier at that time, who made the erection of the bridge one of the pledges of a campaign. Prior to the building of the bridge four ferries from the city to Nashwaaksis, St. Mary's Ferry, Gibson and Lower St. Mary's placed the means of communication. During those seasons when the ice was forming or breaking up in the river, hotels on either bank did considerable trade with travellers who were ice-stayed. It is said that the first ice-run after the bridge was built, saw certain residents out-er offering prayers that the bridge would not stand the strain. They feared that use of the bridge would injure the hotel business. "The prayers of the righteous availeth much", it is said, but evidently the righteous were not included among those who prayed that the bridge would go out, for it stayed there for many years, until an unfortunate fire burned out the central spans.

Time works wonders. It need not be a long time either as witnesseth the mellowing which had come over the spirit of Mr. Frank Leslie Potts during the four sessions in which he has represented the city of St. John in the New Brunswick Legislature. From a fire-eater whose eloquent utterances in defence of the English tongue against the insidious attacks of the French-Canadian thrilled the House and caused Conservative delegations from the French counties to appear and have the soft-pedal applied to him, he has changed to a member with as many friends among the French representation as among the English. When he "speaks out in meeting" it is against Prohibition or some matter other than the language question.

In connection with the visit of the local delegation to Ottawa to press upon the Militia Council the claims of Fredericton as a location for a unit of permanent forces, it may be remembered that barrack accommodation here is not what it used to be. In the days of the Imperial troops, men were crowded in quarters in a way which nowadays would be thought unsanitary. Twelve or more to a fair-sized barrack-room was the ordinary thing and old "residents" tell of the days when married-quarters merely meant the corner of a barrack-room screened off from the rest. Even under conditions little better than that it took five buildings to accommodate one battalion of the Cheshire Regiment, then the 22nd Foot, when stationed in Fredericton just after the "Trent Affair". The buildings were the present barracks, two in Queen street and the Park Barracks in Regent street, the lower story of the present Court House, the basement of the City Hall which stood on the site of the present City Hall and the Exhibition Buildings. The latter stood on the site of the residence of Joseph Moore, Westmorland street, and were burned afterward. Accommodations in the Soldiers' Barracks then were more extensive than now for the canteen and cook-house as well as other

important offices were located in the casemates or vaults which form the ground story. When "H" Company, Royal Canadian Regiment, was transferred here from St. John's, Que., in 1906 its officer commanding insisted that canteen and cook-house be removed to the second story. There was no good reason for the removal but it was made and a number of excellent barrack-rooms were occupied in so doing.

During the interval between the departure of the Imperial troops in 1869 and the organization of the Infantry School Corps of Canada in 1884 the barracks were put to various, and some times remarkable uses. The first Normal School was in the Soldiers' Barracks, Queen street. The introduction of the "free schools" saw the same building and the Park Barracks, Regent Street, put to use for schools. The present guardhouse in Carleton street served as police station and police-court for several years. Judge Wilson is one of the older generation of lawyers who pleaded cases there. At another time the court and office of the police magistrate were located in the Officers' Quarters. The late Col. Marsh who died in 1914 shortly after being superannuated, occupied the office at that time. At that period in Fredericton's history when a temperance wave swept over it, the Soldiers' Barracks was put to the strangest use of all the Fredericton Reform Club and the Women's Christian Temperance Union being given rooms there. The names of both organizations were painted upon the stonework and may be seen there today. The chief mover in the Fredericton Reform Club was the late Banks Mackenzie, a professional temperance organizer who had a great following in his day in various parts of the United States and Canada.

The sun-dial at the eastern gable of the Soldiers' Barracks probably is without counterpart anywhere. The existing instrument is a reproduction of the original one which it is believed was placed in position in 1829 when the building was erected. By fit the real time—not standard time—can be told accurately from 5 a. m. until 1 p. m. during the summer.
