Sugar May Be Dearer.

According to the quotations made by importers, it is thought that the price of sugar next month in the Unit ed States, loaded at the refineries, will be from \$35 to \$37 a hundred weight. The Cuhan exporters are quot ing nineteen cents and nineteen and three-quarter cents at the Havana docks, an increase of almost one hundred per cent, over the prevailing prices last year. Steamers loading sugar for Halifax and St. John at Havana have been delayed, according to despatches, by a strike among the dock laborers there.
