SCOTLAND YARD CO-OPERATING WITH U.S. AUTHORITIES IN HUNT FOR NOTORIOUS ANARCHISTS

MAY THROW LIGHT ON WALL STREET OUTRAGE

One of the Men Wanted was a Close Personal Friend of the Assassin of President McKinley--London Their Headquarters Now--Their Activities World Wide.

London, Sept. 26.—Scotland Yard is co-operating with the American secret service in an international man-hunt for two notorious anarchists who it is thought may be able to throw some light on the Wall Street bomb outrage. They are: Malvasi, an Italian anarchist chief, who was a close personal friend of the assassin of President McKinley, and Nicheorst, a Swiss who was prominent in an anarchist outrage here a few years ago. Both are known to make London their headquarters and to have directed activities the world over. They are reported during the war but returned after the armistice and recently disappeared together. It is understood they have gone to America. London is nervous, fearing an explosion. It leaked out a few days ago that a man who has since proved insane penetrated to the basement of the stock exchange and fired several bombs but failed to hit anyone. A bomb exploding in the same place would blow sky-high the head of the London financial world. As a result extra guards have been assigned to the Stock Exchange and the Morgan bank.

ADVENT CONFERENCE ENDS.

Services at Devon Church Concluded Sunday—Annual Meeting at Woodstock.

The quarterly session of the Adventist Christian Church at Devon closed Sunday evening. The meetings were very largely attended and proved a spiritual uplift to all. The speakers present were Rev. M. C. Burt of Woodstock, Rev. O. S. French of Fort Fairfield, Me., Rev. B. W. Carliss of Milltown, Me., Rev. F. J. Hadley of Grand Manan, N. B., and C. P. Henderson of Bear River, N. S.

The messages that were given by these men were very instructive and it is hoped that much good has been accomplished. The annual conference session will be held with the church at Woodstock the first of January 1921.

Sunday Sermon.
Rev. M. C. Burt preached Sunday from Matthew 24: 32-34 and Luke 21st chapter.

He said that the world has rushed the generation which would see the second coming of Christ that the distress of nations of which he spoke was upon us. The perplexity of nations also is before us. That the unspeakable Turk is the last power spoken of in Daniel 11th chapter, and that power is about to come to an end and therefore the time of trouble spoken of by Daniel in chapter 12 verse 1 is right at hand.

Then taking St. Luke's Gospel 21st chapter beginning at the twentieth verse, in 70 A. D., when Jerusalem was destroyed we find Jerusalem trodden down until December 11, 1917. Then General Allenby of the British and Allied forces in Palestine entered Jerusalem. The Turkish oppressors were driven out and soon all the Holy Land was cleared of its Gentile oppressors. Jerusalem is now as free as any city. Consequently we have reached a very important era in the closing of Gentile times. Abounding iniquity is on every hand. The League of Nations cannot save this world but the Second Coming of Christ is the only thing that can bring order out of the present chaos.

Chief Inspector W. D. Wilson has received information from Sub-Inspector Daigle that he seized sixty gallons of alcohol in an American car at Edmundston Sunday. The alcohol came from a point in Quebec province and was destined for the State of Maine.

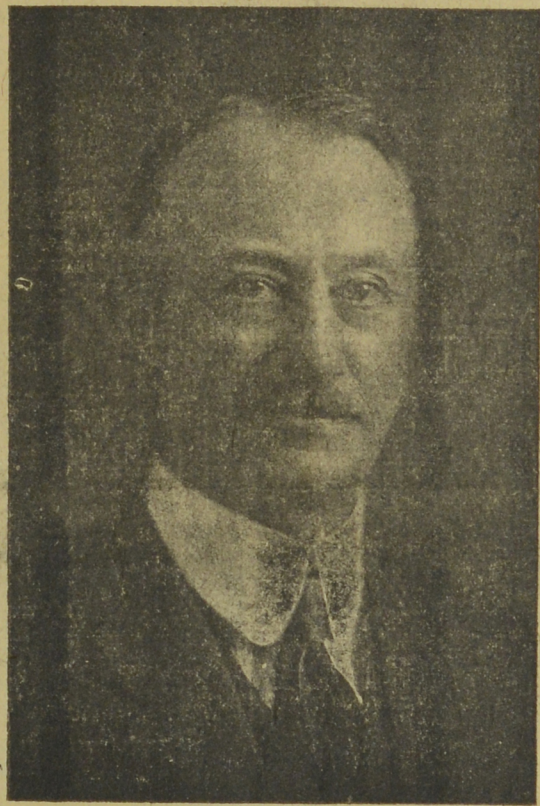
MUNICH, Sept. 27.—The government has discovered a secret monarchist plot to seat the former Crown Prince Rupprecht on the Hapsburg throne. The counter revolution was to be proclaimed on September 25th as a rife congress of the civil guards here. As a result of the exposure all imperial troops will be confined to barracks on the 28th under guard of troops whose loyalty is unquestioned.

HON. C.W. ROBINSON NAMED AS MINISTER OF LANDS AND MINES IN THE LOCAL GOVT.

Popular Member for Moncton City Will Administer the Great Revenue Producing Department of the Administration—Conventions in St. John and Moncton to be Held Today—Strong Men Lining Up for the Fight.

ST. JOHN, Sept. 27.—Premier Foster announced last evening that Hon. Clifford W. Robinson had been offered and had accepted the portfolio of Lands and Mines recently made vacant by the resignation of Hon. Dr. Smith. Hon. Mr. Robinson has been a member of the Foster cabinet without portfolio since its formation in 1917. The news of the appointment will give keen satisfaction all over the province because Mr. Robinson is one of the outstanding public men of the day.

The new minister was born in Moncton and represents that constituency in the Legislature. His father was candidate for Westmorland county on two occasions. He is one of the leading lawyers of the province. In 1896 he contested Westmor-

land county against H. A. Powell, K. C., and was defeated by but fifteen votes. Less than a year later he was elected to the Legislature by acclamation in a by-election and re-elected in the general elections of 1899 and 1903. He was elected Speaker of the third Assembly, Feb. 28, 1901, and of the fourth on March 26, 1903. In 1907 he was made a member of the Executive Council without portfolio in the government led by Hon. William Pugsley and was re-elected at the general elections in March 1908. His party having been defeated, however, he resigned the Premiership on March 20. He was elected at the general elections of 1917 and upon the formation of the Foster cabinet on April 4, 1917, he was taken into the government without portfolio.

Hon. Mr. Robinson will be sworn in as Minister of Lands and Mines within a few days, on the return of the Lieutenant-Governor, who is now absent.

More Conventions.

A convention of the electors of the City of St. John for the selection of candidates for the Legislature will be held this evening. It is understood that Premier Foster will be tendered a nomination for the city and will accept.

The convention of the electors of St. John City and County will also be held this evening. The candidates are likely to be A. F. Bentley, ex-M. P. P., of St. Martins, and Dr. Curren of Fairville.

The electors of Moncton are meeting this afternoon to select a candidate. Mr. C. W. Robinson, who is to be the new Minister of Lands and Mines, will be tendered the nomination.

MIX-UP IN CARLETON CO.

Woodstock, Sept. 27.—Much interest centres in the farmers' convention called to take place here this afternoon, and several interesting rumors are afloat. It is said that there is a movement on foot to drop Mr. Burlock from the ticket and install Mr. W. S. Sutton one of the late members in his place. If this is done a lively row is likely to develop and prominent men in the party are opposed to having any truck with the Tories.

Berlin, Sept. 27.—Abandonment by the Government of the bread subsidy simultaneously with the imposition of the percentage tax on wages which employees are ordered to deduct and pay to the Government is bringing the political dissatisfaction to an acute stage. Many employers have refused to collect. The finances of the Government are in the greater disorder and unemployment is so general that people are in the greatest economic distress. Germany's position is becoming greatly strained and the Government's power is slowly but surely slipping away.

U.S. FIRMS SLOW IN DELIVERING GOODS TO FRENCH PURCHASERS

PARIS, Sept. 27.—French firms are complaining of the failure of American concerns to make deliveries of merchandise sold by their salesmen in France. The French declare that orders are accepted and guarantees given for payment are satisfactory, but that they then wait for deliveries, which sometimes never come. Cable inquiries bring no satisfaction. One French company deposited \$65,000 in a New York bank to guarantee payment of a shipment of coal that never arrived, and so far the French company has been unable to find out if it has been shipped, and it may never have been mined.

WOULD USE THEM FOR IMMORAL PURPOSES

Canadian Immigration Restrictions Very Rigid and Agents Have Taken All Precautions—Vigilance of Authorities is Being Extended—English War Brides Coming Out.

London, Sept. 27.—Report that American white slavers in London are sending women to Canada ostensibly as housemaids and factory workers, to be sent on to the United States for immoral purposes is being investigated by Scotland Yard and the National Vigilance Association. There is no evidence to support the charge and it is felt that the rigid immigration restrictions of Canada would prevent it.

"Our agents in all British ports are most active," said Col. Thompson of the Vigilance Association. "Any such widespread-condition would be impossible." "We have discovered and prevented some instances where women sought to get to Canada and the United States as stowaways. They were few but I suppose some have successfully evaded us but I am sure there were not many." Investigations by Scotland Yard have resulted in an agreement for British Canadian and American authorities to maintain the closest co-operation their vigilance extending even to English women going to the other side as war brides.
