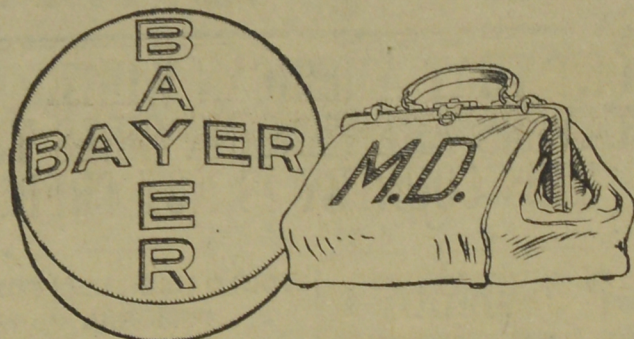

Government Party Names Winning Ticket in York

Magnificent Convention Held Here Saturday—Confidence in Redemption of the County the Keynote of the Proceedings—Coun. John T. Christie, Coun. Frank Coburn, Peter S. Watson and J. Bacon Dickson Placed in Nomination—The Matter of Temperance Alliance Pledge Left to Candidates.

The Government party in York County on Saturday had one of the best conventions ever held in the county and placed in the field four candidates for the general provincial election of October 9th. The ticket is as follows:—

Coun. John T. Christie, Keswick, Farmer.

Coun. Frank Coburn, Harvey Station, Farmer.

Peter S. Watson, Devon, Merchant.
J. Bacon Dickson, Fredericton, Barrister.

The convention was representative of all sections of the county only two of the more remote parishes not sending delegates. Mrs. I. C. Morrison of Queensbury had the distinction of being the first woman to attend a Liberal Convention in York County as a delegate. The nomination was made by a nominating committee composed of a delegate from each parish represented, each town and each of the two polling divisions of Fredericton. Peter J. Hughes of Fredericton and William P. Lawson of McAdam, candidates in 1912, were offered nomination by the committee but declined. In addition to nominating candidates the convention unanimously passed a resolution endorsing the Foster Government and its policies and also passed a resolution of appreciation of the services of P. J. Hughes in connection with the disclosures of wrong-doing on the part of the preceding administration. By resolution it was decided that the question of the importation of liquor into the province, be left to each individual candidate and not to the convention. This matter was brought before the convention by W. G. Clark of Fredericton a member of the executive of the New Brunswick Temperance Alliance.

To Reserve the Standing.

The convention was more than satisfactory to all who have the best interests of the province and the Foster Government at heart. There was great enthusiasm and also a noticeable determination to reserve the standing of parties in York County. The ticket nominated is a strong one and that placed in nomination is weaker than the ticket of 1912 which had a majority of only three hundred. The substitution of Charles D. Richards for Dr. W. C. Crockett lends the ticket no strength and the party has steadily lost ground in this county since the last election. Those who placed the four gentlemen named before, in nomination as Government candidates are determined that the good work of reducing a Conservative majority of 2,300 in 1912 to 300 in 1917 will be continued in 1920 to such an extent that it will vanish utterly.

United Farmer on Ticket.

A feature of the nomination proceedings was the naming of a member of the United Farmers Organization as a candidate. He is Coun. John T. Christie of Keswick who represents the Parish of Bright in the Municipal Council. Coun. Christie although a U. F. member is opposed to that organization entering provincial politics believing that the real interests of the agricultural population can be served better by the organization devoting its attention to other matters. As a municipal councillor he has given good service. The same is true of Coun. Frank Coburn also a farmer, who represents the Parish of Manners Sutton at the

Municipal Council. Both these gentlemen had the distinction at the last municipal election of being elected in districts generally conceded to be strongly Conservative. Coun. Coburn

at that election was elected over a councillor who had been at the council eighteen years. As a highway supervisor for his district he has accomplished notable things.

Mercantile interests are well represented in P. S. Watson of Devon one of the most progressive of the younger business men of the county who through his connection with the York County Commercial Club, Fredericton Park Association and Maritime & Maine Harness Racing Circuit has made a wide acquaintance throughout York County and the province. J.

Bacon Dickson is well known among the younger members of the bar of the province. He has been Clerk Assistant of the House of Assembly and has performed the duties of the office in a manner highly creditable. His father the late J. Howe Dickson formerly of Albert County, for many years clerk of the Executive Council, had a wide acquaintance in all parts of the province. Mr. Dickson also has taken a prominent part in the activities of several organizations in this vicinity.

Chairman's Address.

When A. H. VanWart, chairman of the York County Association, called the convention to order in the Knights of Pythias Hall, Queen street, all seats were taken and many were standing. Mr. VanWart outlined the purpose of the convention and reminded those present of the conditions which had existed under the previous regime the exposure of which Peter J. Hughes

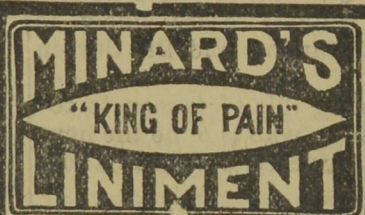
