



GOVERNMENT PARTY NAMES A WINNING TICKET IN YORK CO.

(Continued from Page Two.) who was present, had had no close connection.

Peter J. Hughes.

Peter J. Hughes followed Chairman VanWart. He reviewed briefly some of the scandals which were so notable a feature of Conservative administration of provincial affairs and the successful efforts of those connected with the present government to prove the charges which they had made. The Government party, however, need not rely upon the bad record of its opponents but could point to a notable record of accomplishment. The Agricultural policy carried out under the direction of Hon. J. F. Tweeddale alone was sufficient to recommend the government to many of those present. In addition there was the very important work on the highways carried on by Hon. Mr. Veniot (Applause). The province had been given a network of improved roads. It was the duty of all interested in the welfare of the province to see that the Minister of Public Works is enabled to continue that work. Other measures of great importance and great public benefit were the Public Health Act and The Workmen's Compensation Act. These were important accomplishments but there were greater things for the future. There was the Hydro-electric scheme. He could feel a personal interest in that matter as it had been his good fortune to draft the bill which had been presented to the legislature. Under the provisions of that bill Shogomoc Falls in the County of York would be developed and electric power made available in various communities.

When last the supporters of the party in York had met in convention it had been thought fit that the standard of the party be placed in the hands of Messrs. Burt, Kitchen, Lawson and himself. That standard they handed back to the convention grateful for the privilege of carrying and confident that they returned it without stain or disgrace. (Applause). Some had suggested that the same four carry it again but the members of the old ticket had concluded that it would be better for others to carry it. The new standard-bearers would receive the heartiest support from members of the former ticket.

Government Endorsed.

Mr. Hughes then read the following resolution and moved its adoption:—Whereas the Government, led by the Honourable Walter E. Foster, when it assumed office in April 1917, found the affairs of this Province to be in a most disorganized and unsatisfactory condition; and

Whereas subsequent investigation and enquiry showed that the public records had been fraudulently altered, and that false evidence had been prepared by authority of Members of the Murray Government for the purpose of covering up its transactions and deceiving the Legislature and the public; and

Whereas by sound business methods and efficient administration in the space of a little over three years, Mr. Foster and his colleagues have been able to reorganize the various departments and to change them from implements to instruments of Government working for the public good; and

Whereas by wise and improved methods in all the Departments, the Government has been able to aid all the various industries of the Province; but in particular the Department of Agriculture by constant endeavor and by greatly expanded application, has been able to lend magnificent help to the whole farming industry and to assist in marketing the crops of the Province; and

Whereas many of the roads of this Province, under the direction of the Honourable P. J. Veniot, have been changed from almost impassable ways to great trunk highways of a high standard of perfection, and all the roads have been greatly improved, and preparations have been made for greatly extending this work; and

Whereas in the matters of Public Health and the Workmen's Compensation, and many other ways, the Legis-

lation promoted by this Government has been in the forefront of modern progress; and

Whereas the Government has lately embarked upon a scheme of hydro-electric development by which the waste energy of our rivers and streams is to be harnessed and controlled and brought to the aid of our people, both in city and country;

Be it therefore resolved that this Convention place upon record its confidence in the Foster Government, and its approval of the work already done, and pledge its support to the great measures which the Government has undertaken.

J. J. F. Winslow.

J. J. F. Winslow seconded the adoption of the resolution. One of the most important matters which had come to the attention of the present administration had been the rate of stumpage. Finding it \$1.50 when taking office the Foster Government had raised it successively until it was \$5 at present. Not only had the rate been increased but stumpage on every log had been collected. A progressive forest policy had been followed out. Apart from the ravages of the spruce-bud worm which had appeared in the forests, the latter had been protected in every way. In other provinces of Canada New Brunswick was recognized as having the most up-to-date forest policy in the Dominion. That alone was sufficient to warrant the return of the Government to power. Objection was made by the Opposition that the Government made a good showing because it had more money to spend. That was true but the people did not feel any additional burden of taxation because the money was obtained by development of existing sources of revenue. In defence of the former regime it was urged that the government of that day had produced valuable legislation. To his mind the most valuable legislation it had produced had been the bills for the appointment of the Royal Commissions to investigate the charges made by the two members for Madawaska Hon. L. A. Dugal and Mr. Pelletier.

The resolution was carried unanimously.

Nominating Committee.

On motion of P. J. Hughes seconded by Coun. Elwood Allen of Marysville it was decided to nominate four candidates. Chairman VanWart proceeded to appoint the following committee: Fredericton, P. J. Hughes and J. J. F. Winslow; Devon, H. B. Corwell; Marysville, Rowley Manzer; New Maryland, William McKnight; Bright, Harvey Mitchell; McAdam, W. P. Lawson; Manners Sutton, Alex. Little; Prince William, Albert Smith; Queensbury, I. C. Morrison; Southampton, Coun. Charles Allan; Stanley, Dr. Folkins; Kingsclear, John Myhrall; St. Mary's Ernest Clowater; Canterbury, Mr. Shaw; Douglas, Harry Seymour.

R. W. McLellan.

While the Nominating Committee was deliberating in an adjoining room R. W. McLellan, addressed the convention. He expressed great pleasure on account of the size and enthusiasm of the contention which was gathered to nominate the four men who would represent York County after October 9th. He congratulated Mrs. I. C. Morrison of Queensbury upon being the first woman delegate to a Liberal Convention in York County. It was through the Foster Government that the women had been given the privilege of the franchise. Prior to the defeat of the Murray administration in 1917 there was knowledge of wrong-doing on the part of that government but after the election investigation disclosed that the picture had not been painted black enough. The present campaign found that same old crowd seeking to be returned to power. Recently that party had deemed it expedient to change its leader, but had it improved the situation? The choice of Dr. Baxter came as no surprise. At the time of the change he had scanned the columns of the St. John Standard to find a platform of the new leader. All he could find was criticism of the Foster Government. The Opposition apparently was relying upon its record of the past. When the electors would think of that record there would be few survivors. That record was dangerous freight for an unseaworthy vessel. Rats are said to desert a sinking ship. He meant that in no offensive way. It was noticeable that men of sense were leaving the Opposition. Dr. W. C. Crockett was one. Something was rotten in the state of Denmark when that gentlemen took that course. Even Hon. B. Franklin Smith had announced himself an independent candidate in Carleton County. The Government party, however could not wholly depend on the weakness of its opponents but must get to work in the campaign.

Report of Committee.

J. J. F. Winslow reported from the Nominating Committee. He said that P. J. Hughes and W. P. Lawson both had been urged to permit their names


