

SWEATERS THAT ARE NEW.

Again the question has been asked: Are sweaters done for? Have they run their course and will they have to retire into the oblivion that awaits all fashions that have had their day?

Doubtless the sweaters as we have known it is done for. But so long as there are new and interesting and smart designs and ideas in sweaters so long women will want to wear them. And this year there are many new ideas, and sweaters are charming so that is the answer to the question.

Fringe is used in sweaters to a surprisingly great extent. Perhaps the surprising thing about it is that it has not been used extensively before in the several seasons when fringe has been predominant. Sometimes the fringe is of wool, which is sometimes knotted. Sometimes the fringe extends all along the bottom of the sweater and then again only directly in the front. From France came what was probably the first sweater with wooden bead fringe and it was decidedly smart.

Metallic threads and tinsel are much used on woollen and silk sweaters. Interesting as a novelty are the sweaters that are finished at the neck cuffs and around the bottom with ribbon run through openings in the sweater.

Perhaps the honors are divided between those sweaters that slip over the head and those that fasten in the front. There are some sleeveless sweaters especially liked because they do not muss up sleeves, and that is desirable now that lingerie blouses are going to be worn instead of georgette blouses to so great an extent. Perhaps the most characteristic sweater of the season is the one made with sleeves that terminate just above the elbow. Often they are worn with no blouse beneath and then sometimes with a blouse that has a sleeve that terminates just an inch or so below the sweater, thereby showing a narrow line of white beneath the color of the sweater.

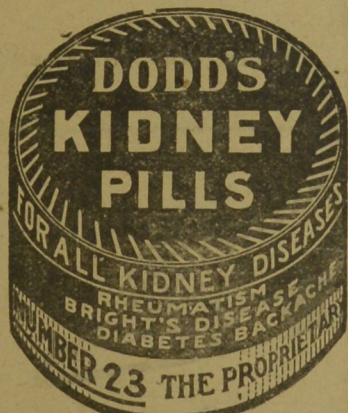
Now as to colors—a point that is always important with sweaters. There are some soft browns that the especially attractive, and some of these browns are trimmed with the new shade of green that is like jade only that it has somewhat more yellow in its makeup. Dark colors are liked rather well at the winter resorts navy blue, dark brown and black being in vogue. The new Blue Bird blue has been represented in a number of sweaters and there are several striking sweaters of white and black combination.

HOSIERY HINTS.

In hosiery the vogue is for sheer silk in plain colors, such as gray or tan. The color employed is so pale and the stocking so sheer that when worn the effect is as if no stocking at all was worn.

Certain of the French manufacturers are bringing out new lines in silk stockings in much heavier quality but for spring there is little chance that these will be adopted, stockings of the sheerest, thinnest quality possible being the strong note.

Openwork effects in striped and in fancy floral designs are prominent. Insertions of lace, generally black lace in black stockings, have some representation. By all odds, however, preference is given to plain stockings with fine openwork clocks or without clocks.

POLITICAL AFFAIRS IN SOUTH AFRICA

London, England, March 18—In the London office of the South African high commissioner the opinion is that too much is being made in the newspapers of the nationalist victory in the recent South African elections. Gen. Hertzog and his irredentist Boers did get a surprising increase in votes but even now with twelve districts still indeterminate they control only thirty-seven seats in a parliament of 121—that is, a minority of less than one-third.

It is not believed that the twenty-one labor delegates who hold the balance of power will side with the Boers on the question of separation from the British crown. The principal issue in the elections was "Do the people of South Africa wish to form a separate and distinct republic independent of the British empire?" Gen. Hertzog affirmed that they did when he advocated this step before the peace conference. Lloyd George is said to have replied that it was a question for the South African parliament and not for the imperial cabinet to decide.

See Boers Equally Divided

Now it seems that in four of the autonomous provinces possessing almost complete home rule the question has been decided in the negative. As many Boers voted for Gen. Smuts, who favors imperial union, as for Gen. Hertzog.

Nevertheless the elections show distinct dissatisfaction with existing conditions. The irredentist vote was doubled and labor leaped into a prominence it never enjoyed before. A combination of republicans and laborites is possible and even probable on any

point save independence. This may make it impossible for Premier Smuts to gain a working majority.

With neither side able to form a cabinet a deadlock may ensue with new elections as the only visible solution. It is said that Gen. Smuts is now considering this.

"There must be a great deal of misunderstanding abroad about the nationalist program," said an official in the high commissioners office to me. "They advocate constitutional independence, but no violent revolution like that of the Sinn Feiners. Moreover, even if given a parliamentary majority, it is difficult to see how they could carry out their idea. By virtue of the treaty of union of 1902 every South African is ipso facto a British citizen. Every member of parliament and every government functionary must take the oath of allegiance to the crown on his assumption of office.

No Rioting or Fighting

"These are imperial laws. How could Gen. Hertzog and his nationalists change them by constitutional action in South Africa alone? Their program seems to be largely a matter of sentiment. There is no rioting or fighting among our people. Of course excitement exists, as in all general elections. Whatever antipathy there may be to the independence of the Boers or vice versa appears to be expressed by boycotting or newspaper propaganda. After all, you know that South Africa has only 3,125,000 inhabitants."

NOTICE OF LEGISLATION.

Public notice is hereby given that application will be made at the next session of the Legislative Assembly, by the City of Fredericton, for the passage of a bill or bills for the following purposes:

(a) To amend the City of Fredericton Assessment Act, 1907, and in particular section 46 thereof, so as to provide that tax notices may be mailed to ratepayers or delivered personally, as the City Treasurer may decide, under the direction of the Finance Committee.

(b) That the said Assessment Act be further amended so as to provide that all females assessed on income or property, real or personal, within the City of Fredericton, and who shall have paid their taxes within the time limited thereby by the said Act, shall be entitled to vote at City elections.

(c) For authority to make a grant for a Memorial in memory of soldiers who lost their lives during the Great War, either by way of assessment or by borrowing, as the City Council may decide.

(d) For authority to grant to the John Palmer Company, Limited, exemption from taxation for a period of twenty years from and including the year 1920; free sewerage for the same period of time under such limitation as the City Council may decide, and water for all purposes at the fixed rate of ten cents per thousand gallons, for the said period of twenty years.

Frame, stucco on frame or brick veneer, inclusive of value of land and local improvements, \$3000. to \$5000.

Brick, hollow tile, concrete, with roofing of fire-proof materials, inclusive of value of land and local improvements, \$4000. to \$4500.

Notice may be given personally to any of the undersigned, or by letter addressed to the Chairman.

The Board shall be glad to receive from intending applicants any plans or suggestions they may care to submit.
