WAS ONLY A CHEAP PRACTICAL JOKE

Its Purpose was Evidently to Cause Annoyance to Royal Family-Was Sent by Scotland Yard Code to the Chief, of Detectives at the Castle.

London, Oct. 1-A fake message to Balmoral Castle, ostensibly from Scotland Yard which threw the Castle in to a panic yesterday caused King George to change his arrangement. The message indicated that the author ities suspect as a Sinn Fein plot though it may be only a cheap practical joke meant to annoy the Royal family. It was sent by Scotland Yard ode to the Chief of Detectives at the Castle where the King is spending his vacation, warning His Majesty not to go beyond the walls that day and advising him further that instruction was to follow. As a result the King cancelled all engagements for the day ncluding his annual inspection of the South Highland volunteers of which the Duke of York is Colonel.

Before further advices were receive ed from London the Chief of Detectives who was at Balmoral Castle wired regarding the first message and was told that it did not come from Scotland Yard, but was a forgery. The authorities are now making strict inquiry. They are inclined to suspect one Irish member of the staff who has access to the code.
