BRITISH SPECIALIST HAS NEW WEAPON WHICH HE CLAIMS WILL CONQUER DREADED INFLUENZA

ANTISEPTIC WADS FOR THE NOSTRILS

It Will be Impossible for Anyone Breathing Through the Apparatus to Contract the Disease—May Save Thousands of Lives.

Special to the Daily Mail. Copyright 1920 by Cross Atlantic News Service. London, Oct. 1—Influenza has been conquered by a new discovery. The next influenza wave that attacks Europe will be met by a new weapon invented by a British specialist, which consists of two anti-septic wads on a bridge that clip into the nostrils, killing all germs. It is claimed that it is impossible for anyone breathing through the nose and wearing this apparatus to contract influenza. The invention was tested by keeping a man for two hours in a room that had been drenched with influenza germs. He was not affected in any way by the plague. Several American doctors in London say that anti-septic breathing would reduce the mortality from grippe and influenza at least two thirds, and that it would have saved thousands of lives in the last epidemic. After Small's Secretary *London, Oct. 1—Scotland Yard has sent a request to Canadian authorities for a description and details of John Doughty, secretary of Ambrose Small, who disappeared from Toronto last December. A reward is offered for information leading to the arrest of Doughty who is wanted for theft and concerned in the disappearance of Small.

E. P. BRADT TENDERS HIS RESIGNATION

Goes Into Effect October 31—Will Conduct Fruit Farm in the Niagara Peninsula.

E. P. Bradt, B. S. A., who has been Deputy Minister of Agriculture for the province since January 1918 has sent in his resignation to the Minister of Agriculture the same to take effect Oct. 31st. Mr. Bradt is taking up the business of commercial fruit growing at Niagara-on-the-Lake, Ontario. The fruit farm which he has secured is well planted out and all the trees are in their prime. It contains over one thousand five hundred peach trees, four acres of grapes, several acres of pears, plums and cherries, and a considerable acreage of small fruits such as strawberries, raspberries, currants and gooseberries. It is considered one of the best fruit farms in the district and is situated close to shipping facilities both by Hydro Radial and Lake navigation. The business is taken over as a going concern and includes a full equipment of modern implements for fruit growing on a large scale. Possession of the place is secured on Nov. 1st. Mr. Bradt prior to coming to New Brunswick was supt. of District Representatives for the Ontario Dept. of Agriculture at Morrisburg, Ont. His home has been at Cayuga near Hamilton, Ont. H. Catlow of St. John, belonging to the C. F. R. Investigation Service, is registered at the Barker House. A. W. Covey, of St. John, president of the Maritime Provinces Branch A. A. SOME EXCELLENT SPEECHES ON ISSUES OF CAMPAIGN HEARD AT OPERA HOUSE

Hon. P. J. Veniot Tells of the Good Work Accomplished by the Foster Administration—Hypocrisy of the Opposition Laid Bare—Hydro Development Will Mean Much to Fredericton—Speeches by Dickson and Watson.

Notwithstanding inclement weather, supporters of the Foster government residing in the city and Devon rallied to the Opera House last evening in large numbers and listened to able and convincing addresses by Hon. P. J. Veniot, Minister of Public Works, and Messrs. J. B. Dickson and P. S. Watson, two of the party candidates in York. The meeting was late in starting as the Minister of Public Works and both candidates had doubled up by addressing a gathering of the electors at Marysville earlier in the evening and did not reach the Opera House until nine o'clock. The Minister spoke for nearly an hour and his review of the achievements of the Foster administration presented to the audience in contrast with the maladministration and crookedness of the old regime, was followed with the greatest interest and seemed to make a deep impression upon the audience. An announcement by the Minister that the new trunk highway from central to northern New Brunswick would be routed via Fredericton and Marysville was greeted with hearty applause. In discussing the Highway Act the Minister created great amusement by contrasting flattering testimonials received from Messrs. A. R. Slipp and R. B. Hanson, of this city, with the carping criticism of the roads now emanating from these gentlemen on the hustings. Messrs. OPPOSITION BOSSES NOT IN HAPPY MOOD

Ticket in York is Not Making a Hit With Electors—Col. McLeod's Position in the Campaign.

The opposition party in York is any thing but a happy family at the present time. The ticket chosen to contest the County is a lamentably weak one and not adapted to present day needs. The St. John Standard Mr. Baxter's personal organ recognized this at the outset and handed the York County Opposition managers a solar plexus blow the day after their convention by suggesting that Messrs Pinder and Young be eliminated and their places on the ticket be given to two farmers. This plan had been already tried but the farmers absolutely refused to fall for it. Mr. Pinder offered to step out if ex-Warden Stairs would take his place but the ex-Warden was up to snuff and would not enter into the arrangement. As no other man of standing in the upper end of the county could be induced to run the bosses had to fall back on Mr. Pinder. This explains why he is in the field today. Col. McLeod's Stand Col. McLeod's activities in the campaign are causing no little comment and considerable amusement. As a member of parliament Col. McLeod's is regarded even by his own party friends as a dead one. He wants to be shelved and it is said, would not be averse to accepting a county court judgeship to which under ordinary circumstances he would be fairly entitled. But his chances of landing the plum are being hazarded by serious opposition, and strange to say it has developed within his own party. His opponents take the ground that judgeships should only go to sound lawyers who are in active practice, and they hold that the Colonel does not come under this category. It is known that at least one prominent Conservative Ping's Counsel in this city has declared that if Col. McLeod is appointed to the bench he will not practice in the courts before him. Col. McLeod knows all about the opposition that has developed and it is said that he only consented to take a hand in this election with the understanding that the judgeship would be his for the asking. With certain defeat staring them in the face, the opposition candidates and the party managers in York are not in a happy frame of mind at the present time and it would not be a matter for surprise should some important changes be made in the personnel of the ticket on or before Nomination Day. SCULPTOR HAS TURNED WAITER

London, Sept. 26.—A sculptor for whom the King sat a few years ago, is today attending the wants of thirsty customers in the garden of the Robin Hood Hotel, Kingston Vale, Surrey. He is Mr. Crosland McLure, a middle-aged and distinguished looking man, known to regular customers as "Mac". Mr. McLure told a Daily Mail reporter yesterday that he continued his art up to 1915. Afterwards he worked for two years in a munition factory and then assisted another sculptor. "People have no mercy or statues these days, and like many other people, I have had to adapt myself to circumstances," he said. "I had two studios in London—at Pembroke Gardens Kensington, and at Rednor Street, Chelsea. About 1912 I was working on a statue of the King in his Coronation robes. The King granted me a sitting at Buckingham Palace and afterwards he came to my studio inspected the work, and congratulated me. "The Statue, which was in bronze, was erected in Madras. "I consider that my best work was the South African War Memorial which stands opposite Leicester Town Hall. I did some of the outside work on the Usher Hall, Edinburgh."

UNPRECEDENTED CRIME WAVE IS NOW SWEEPING OVER GERMANY

BERLIN, Oct. 1.—Authorities are powerless to stop the unprecedented crime wave now sweeping Germany. Robberies, murders, house breaking and frauds that are rampant throughout the republic have formed a problem difficult to solve. The Frankfurt police are offering rewards totalling a half million marks for the capture of murderers, thieves and burglars. Three hundred thousand marks are offered for the capture of some platinum thieves.
