

## WESLEY UPTON WAS DROWNED AT SEWELL'S

FELL WHEN STEPPING  
FROM TUG TO A BOAT

Sons Survive in This City—  
Worked on the River All  
His Life—Could Not  
Swim.

Robert Wesley Upton a well known resident of Upper Sheffield who had been employed since boyhood on steamers and tugboats in the River St. John, was drowned last night at about eight o'clock at Sewell's some eight miles east of Fredericton. He was stepping from the tug Lily (Glasier) on which he was employed, to a small boat, and fell between the two. He was never seen afterward. The weather was thick and darkness was coming and little attempt could be made to search for the body. The tugboat had just tied up at Sewell's when the accident occurred. Although he had worked about the river all his life the victim could not swim. This morning word of the accident was brought here and grappling irons which are kept at the police station were sent to the scene of the accident.

### Surviving Relatives.

The deceased was aged forty-five years and is survived by a widow and two sons Parker and Glen who are employed with The Palmer-McLellan Shoe and Tug Company in this city. There also are three brothers and one sister. They are Fred in New Hampshire, Marshall and Trueman of Fredericton and Mrs. Harry Fradsham of Ripples. Up to this afternoon the body had not been recovered. The tug Helen Glasier took a crew from the boom to Sewell's and Charles Fleet of Fredericton who has recovered many bodies from the river also has gone to the scene.

### Still Waiting Fair Weather.

The seaplane in which Col. Leckie and Major Hobbs are making the Montreal-Halifax flight, is still lying in the river at Kingsclear awaiting fair weather to continue the flight.

### Case Settled.

The non-support case which was before the police court Thursday was settled this morning and the charge preferred by the wife against the husband was withdrawn. C. L. Dougherty appeared for the defendant.

Rt. Rev. Charles D. Schofield, Bishop of Columbia, will be the preacher at Christchurch Cathedral, Sunday evening. Bishop Schofield was Dean of Christchurch Cathedral for several years and needs no introduction to Fredericton people.

### Pleaded Guilty.

George A. King of Blaney Ridge charged with stealing an order for transportation on the C. P. R. elected to be tried by Police Magistrate Limerick here and pleaded guilty this morning. He was remanded for sentence, on Monday next. The accused is liable to an extreme sentence of two years in penitentiary.

### Died at St. Andrew's

There entered into rest at St. Andrew's this morning, after a long illness Mrs. Hannah Hanson, of St. Andrew's, N. B., and mother of School Inspector R. D. Hanson and R. B. Hanson, K. C., of this city. The deceased was in her seventy-eighth year and had many friends in this city, where for a number of winters she made her home with her sons. The funeral will take place from her late residence at St. Andrew's on Sunday next.

### Milk Supply Criticized.

The Board of Health of the Fredericton Sub-District met last night, using the new office in the Royal Bank Building for the first time. The reports of City Analyst H. H. Hagerman on the water supply and Inspector A. C. Fleming on general conditions were received and were satisfactory. The report on the milk supply was not satisfactory but there was an adverse report in regard to cleanliness. The two dealers were warned that an immediate change must be made.

### Sir George Arrives.

Sir George E. Foster, Minister of Trade and Commerce arrived here at noon today from Ottawa. He is the guest of Dr. and Mrs. G. C. VanWart. Sir George's visit to Fredericton has no political significance but he is to be chief speaker at the George Street Baptist Church tonight in the observance of the seventy-fifth anniversary of the church. Sir George while a professor at the University of New Brunswick and before that when a teacher in the city schools was a prominent member and officer of that church.

### Fine Was Imposed.

Police Magistrate Limerick gave judgment this morning in a case in which a local man was charged with driving a motor-vehicle while under the influence of liquor. He stated that the public must be protected and that he had adopted the course of giving a sentence of ten days in jail in the case of convictions. In the case under consideration, however, on account of representations which had been made and on account of a promise that the accused would not drive the car again this season, he would impose a fine of twenty-five dollars, the maximum under the act.

## CANDLE LIGHT SERVICE FOR CELEBRATION

LIGHTS FAILED AT THE  
GEORGE STREET CHURCH

### Rev. W. C. Machum

A splendid address was given by Rev. Waldo C. Machum, Field Secretary of the Maritime Baptist Sunday School Board and Young People's Societies. Mr. Machum is one of the large number of young men who have gone out from the George St. Church into the Christian Ministry. He is making a great success of his work and the George St. people feel justly proud of him. His sister Miss Grace Machum is the representative of the George St. Church out in India. Mr. Machum expressed his pleasure at being able to be present at the 75th anniversary in the old George St. Church his home church. This was Denominational night and the Baptists of these Maritime Provinces had a great opportunity. The great need of the world today was Jesus Christ. Earl Taylor had a vision of carrying the gospel to the whole world in this generation. He saw the necessity of a larger outlay of men and money. When he asked the Methodist Episcopal Church of the United States of which he was a member, for \$165,000,000 instead of five million they were spending each year for religious work, they laughed at him and said it could not be done. But fifty Christian business men of his denomination after prolonged prayer said it could be done and should be done and under the leadership of the Holy Spirit \$200,000,000 has been raised by his church. The great Forward Movement was launched under the impulse of the Spirit of God. Maritime Baptists five years ago set before themselves a Five Year Programme. Some thought it impossible of attainment, but the goal has not only been reached but overpassed. The task was to reach \$100,000 this year and it looks now as if \$120,000 would be received. There are splendid possibilities for the Baptists of these Maritime provinces and it is for us to grasp them.

### Government Campaign Continues

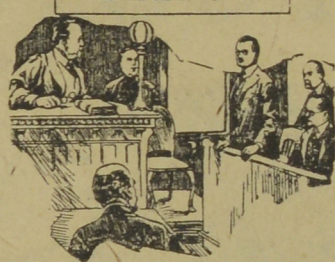

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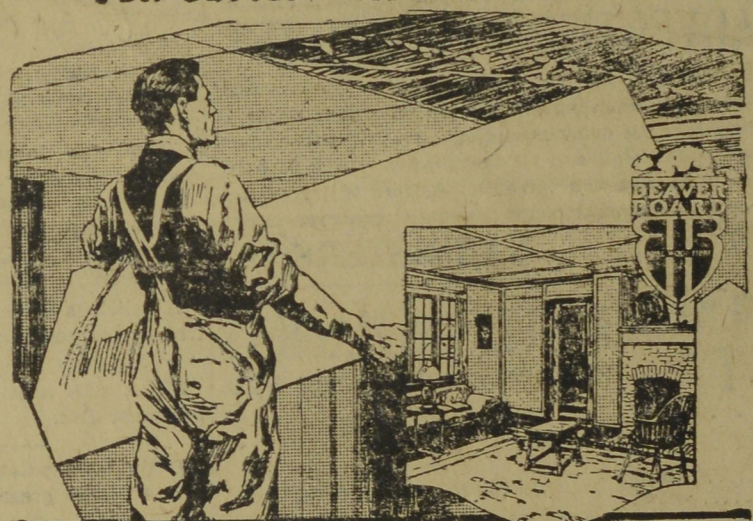
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
