## OF INTEREST TO WOMEN

### BLACK CURRANT PRESERVES

Wash and stem the currants and to each pound add one cup of red currant juice or red raspberry juice (the red raspberry juice make the preserve sweeter than the currant juice), and one pound of granulated sugar. Heat all together to the boiling point and skim constantly. Do not stir, but shake the pan frequently. Simmer for 15 minutes, then seal air-tight in hot, sterilized jars.

### BLACKBERRY JAM

To each pound of hulled and washed blackberries add three-fourths of a pound of granulated sugar, mashing the fruit slightly with the sugar. Bring to the boiling point and let simmer 10 minutes then set aside over night. The following morning boil down until thick (skimming constantly while cooking) and when cold cover with paraffin.

### PRESERVED BLACKBERRIES FOR PIES

Add one-third of currants (stemmed) to two-thirds raspberries. Crush the fruit, bring it to a boil and allow to cook for 20 minutes. Then add three-fourths the amount of sugar that you had of the combined fresh berries; let boil until thick, skimming when necessary. Cover down with paraffin when cold.

### "MAKE A NOTE ON IT"

To prevent cut steel ornaments from rusting rub them occasionally with vaseline.

To set the color in goods use one cupful of salt to a gallon of water and soak for a few hours.

Use a long handled button hook to wind the curtain springs.

Try putting a piece of adhesive plaster on your finger when crocheting and avoid the needle pricking it.

Rub white knife handles that have become yellow with fine emery paper.

Pass a damp mop rapidly over matting; this removes the dust and lint.

## THE HIGH COST OF LUMBER

The Canadian Lumberman tells why the price of lumber is high. In 1913 men's wages in the lumber industry were \$28 to \$32 a month; in 1919, they were \$70 to \$85 a month (both being in addition to board and housing). according to the New Brunswick Lumbermen's Association in accounting for the high cost of lumber. In 1913, stumpage was \$1.50 and mileage \$8; today we pay \$3.50 stumpage, \$8 mileage and \$3.20 a mile for fire protection, also we have workmen's compensation for logging, river driving, rafting, milling and loading, with a separate rate on each, and this still further adds to the cost; in addition, there is the heavy business Dominion war tax. The logging engineer for one of the Montana districts of the Forest Service, as a result of an investigation in the larger band mills of the district, shows in detailed figures why manufactured lumber sells at \$40 a thousand feet or more, though the timber is bought on the stump for from \$2 to \$5 a thousand, logging operations cost \$14 to \$20 a thousand. From the pond to the cars including the manufacture of the rough lumber, the costs are \$11 to \$16 a thousand, these figures being based on records from mills sawing 600,000-600 feet of timber during the season of 1919.

## BREAD DUE FOR AN INCREASE

Ottawa, Aug. 13.—The price of bread in Canada, taking the whole Dominion for an average increased during June to the extent of nearly one-half a cent per 24 ounce loaf. Flour increased in cost 65 cents per barrel, equivalent to one-quarter of a cent per pound or about two-fifths of a cent per 24 ounce loaf. Other increased costs in baking and delivery bring the increase to nearly the one-half a cent, given above. The total average cost of bread throughout the Dominion was eight and three-fifths cents per pound, equivalent to twelve and nine-tenths cents per pound and a half loaf.
