## THE TEXTILE INDUSTRY.

Mr. Alfred F. Barker, Professor in Textile Industries at the University of Leeds, has made a report upon the textile industry in Canada which must give Canadians generally a good deal of satisfaction. "On the whole," says a quotation made by the Montreal Herald from Professor Barker's report, "the Canadian wool mills come up to the best of the Yorkshire mills. Some few Yorkshire mills are better, many very much worse. The machinery employed (in the Canadian mills) is frequently up-to-date. Labor was obviously considerably treated." No industries in Canada are very old and the textile industry—the modern textile industry—is not the oldest. It speaks well for Canadian enterprise and energy and skill that in a comparatively short time the industry should have reached that standard of efficiency which Professor Barker has found to exist and present conditions warrant confidence that the future will bring much greater things. Generally speaking, the textile industry in Canada has been carried on at handsome profit, unreasonably great profits in one or two notorious instances; it was not Professor Barker's duty to point it out but it may nevertheless be said that an industry which is as well established and well equipped as the textile industry should be giving the Canadian people some of the benefits of its success by resting content with smaller profits and so reducing prices to the public.

## HUMAN PEDIGREES.

The suggestion by physicians in session at Atlantic City a short time ago that perfect human beings be registered and pedigreed "the same as high class thoroughbreds of the lower animals," will shock some persons, others will consider the proposal logical. Something of the kind has been started in most states through laws requiring the registration of all births. Some commonwealths go further and compel matrimonial candidates to answer under oath a number of questions intended to reveal their fitness for marriage. It is only a step in the same direction to require men and women intending to marry to submit to an examination that would show whether or not their offspring is apt to be normal in body and mind. A central bureau where such information could be inspected by persons wishing to choose a life partner would make more happy marriages, it is true, but what would it do to courtship?

Presence of mind on the part of a chauffeur saved a party from Aberdeen, the occupants of a motor car, while descending Cairn Well, the highest public road in Great Britain, recently. He found that his brakes were defective, and realizing that it would be courting disaster to try to negotiate the Devil's Elbow, famous for motor accidents, he decided to jump the embankment, trusting that the car would land upright on the rough slope of the hill. His plan succeeded, and the car landed square among the boulders and heather beside a small stream. Except for the shock, the occupants were uninjured. The wheels of the car were smashed.

Half the babies born in Bombay die before reaching the age of eighteen months. In Delhi also the pathetic feature of the birthrate is the terrible wastage that occurs in the first year. One out of every four children born in 1919 was doomed to die within twelve months, and in 1918 one in every three died in the first year of its existence. These figures appear to be a greater reflection on the Western India city, for if there is any excuse to be found in the congestion of Bombay, where the majority of children are born in darkness and despair, there is less in Delhi, which has certainly room to expand.

## NEW INCIDENTS FOR DISCUSSION RE THE POLICE

Joint Meeting Tonight Same as Any Committee Meeting—Incendiary Fire and Prisoner's Escape.

The joint meeting between the City Council and the Police Commission will take place tonight at the City Hall. Mayor Reid declared this afternoon that the meeting would be of the same nature as any committee meeting. Such meetings are not open to the general public.

Additional Incidents for Discussion. The incidents of Halloween and the preceding night brought the matter to the attention of the City Council and occasioned severe criticism of the police force and its methods. Over the week-end there were two additional incidents which will furnish subject matter for discussion. One was the attempt to burn the barn at the residence of Patrolman Dell Hartt early Sunday morning and the other was the arrest by Patrolman Murray of a man on Carleton Street Saturday night and his subsequent escape from the police man.

Incendiary Fire. An alarm from box 6 called the firemen out at 1.30 Sunday morning. The fire was in the barn at 455 York Street premises owned and occupied by W. Dell Hartt, policeman. Mr. Hartt states that the building had not been used for some time and that as far as he could decide had been set. The blaze broke out in the lower story and the roof and upper part of the building were damaged before the fire was put out. The damage amounts to several hundred dollars without insurance.

Prisoner Got Away. There was considerable excitement on Carleton Street late Saturday night. Patrolman Murray arrested a man for drunkenness. The prisoner resisted and struck the policeman, finally getting away. In the mixup a side window of Ryan's drug-store was broken. Policeman Murray asked Arthur J. Ryan, owner of the store to telephone to the police station for another policeman and says Mr. Ryan told him to do his own telephoning. The escaped prisoner used some choice language after his escape his remarks being directed toward the policeman.

Chief Finley this morning declined to make any statement concerning the action which would be taken in the case.
