

FREDERICTON HIGH WON TITLE OF INTERSCHOLASTIC LEAGUE

Scoreless Tie Played at College Field Saturday—Visiting Team Claimed That a Try was Scored by Them and Protest Will be Made—Supporters of Fredericton High Celebrated in Their Own Way After the Game.

The Fredericton High School won the 1920 title of the New Brunswick Interscholastic Rugby Football League here Saturday afternoon by holding the heavier St. John High School team to a draw. The home team had the better of the game until within a few minutes of the end of the match when St. John High showed a great reversal of form and pressed Fredericton High hard the superior weight of the visiting team giving a big advantage.

St. John Had Outside Chance
St. John High had an outside chance of winning the league by winning Saturday's game. Fredericton High by winning or tying could win the league. When time was called with no score the home team had the title.

Celebration After Game

The Fredericton High players and their supporters celebrated after the game. Taking a leaf out of the U. N. B. book a clown band had been formed. This headed the procession which marched through the chief streets. Public buildings and some places of business were visited.

First Half

For St. John Frazer took the kick off. Cain kicked into touch for a long gain. The play for some time was around the St. John 25 yard line and gains were made by St. John. Their eight-man scrum was able to control the ball but the hard and persistent tackling of the F. H. S. halves made the advance of their opponents a backward process. Flood especially started in tackling and was knocked out at the end of ten minutes play but returned to the game. Hickson made a fine punt to touch on the St. John five yard line. Their forwards got away with a dribble and for the first time got the ball in F. H. S. territory. The local team then bucked up and for the first time in the game the forwards heeled the ball Cain got away with a fine start but stumbled. Captain Yerxa was injured at this period in the play but went into action again after a few minutes.

The play was forced well back into St. John territory but the ball was punted by St. John across the fifty yard line when the whistle for half time sounded.

Second Half

In the second half, for the first few minutes, the play zig zagged around centre field then the Yellow and Black teamsupped forward to their opponents five yard line and stayed there for about ten minutes. During that time Flood carried the ball across the line but had several men on his back at the time. In a few minutes St. John touched for a safety. About mid-field

the F. H. S. scrum got the ball out to the halves and the best passing and longest run of the game ended by Daggett being tackled five yards from the St. John goal line. Had he passed to McCaffrey who had a clear field his team could have been cheering over a try.

St. John by punts into touch relieved the situation and forced the play to the other end of the field. Here the fiercest and best play of the game resulted. The well trained pupils of Coach Egbert Cass fought for every inch of ground they yielded. With only a few minutes to go Frazer carried the pigskin across the line but was forced to touch-in-goal over this. The game is being protested St. John claiming it was a try.

What looked like a sure try for St. John was prevented by a fine flying tackle by Maurice Cain, probably the best seen here for years. The game ended in the F. H. S. 25 yard line.

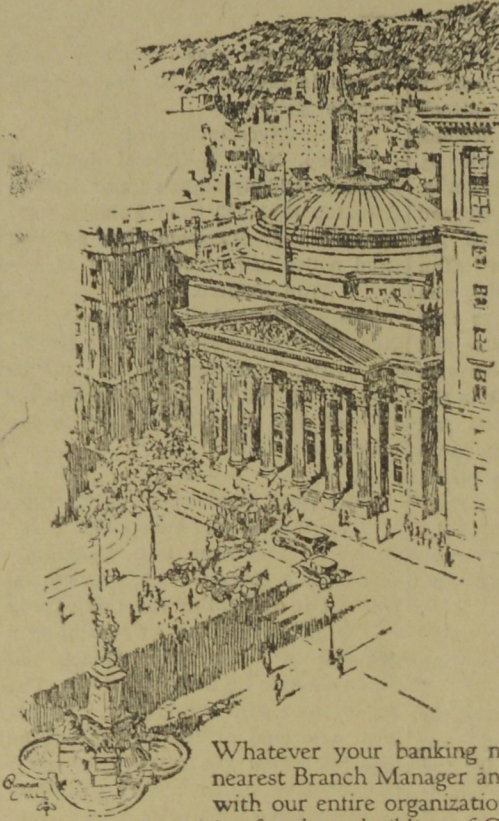
SUGAR DOWN IN TORONTO

Toronto Nov. 5.—Though the retail price of sugar has dropped in Toronto stores to 14½ cents in some localities and 15½ cents down town, there are good prospects for further declines within a few days.

Where and when the bottom of the sinking market will be reached still appears as uncertain as ever. Reports from Montreal of the beginning of an orgy of price-cutting among the refiners in the sugar market were partially confirmed here today by the willingness of their agents to talk price instead of adhering rigidly, as heretofore to the listed quotations.

Part of Glasgow will be dry after May 1st.

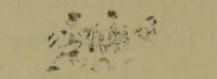
