Line a baking dish with rich bis uit dough and dredge with flour. Drain one quart of oysters, season with salt, pepper and butter, pour into the baking dish, adding some of the oyster liquid, dredge with flour and cover with a top crust, leaving a small opening in the centre. Bake in a quick

OYSTERS ON TOAST.

Fry nice, targe oysters with bacon after having dipped them in egg and cracker dust. Have ready some hot buttered toast. Put three oysters on each slice of toast and cover with strips of crisp bacon. Season with a ittle salt, pepper and a few drons lemon juice and serve very hot.
