CREAMED OYSTERS.

Cook oysters, until they plump, in a
tablespoonful of butter and a tea-
spoonful of lemon juice. Remove oys-
ters with a draining spoon and add
another half tablespoonful of butter
to the liquid in pan. Stir into this a
tablespoonful of flour and stir until
well blended, but do not brown. Add
a cupful of scalded milk gradually
and stir until thick and smooth. Sea-
son with salt, pepper and paprika
and turn in the oysters. Serve as
soon as they are scalded.

Scalloped Oysters With Macaroni.

Scalloped oysters can be made with
boiled macaroni instead of bread
crumbs and it makes a most substan-
tial dish. Place a layer of macaroni in
a buttered baking dish, over it place
oysters, sprinkle with salt, pepper
and bits of butter, alternate until dish
is filled. Cover the top with buttered
bread crumbs and bake until crumbs
are brown. The oyster liquid and milk
or butter can be kept hot on the stove
to baste the oysters with, should they
become too brown and dry on top.

OYSTER PIE

Line a baking dish with rich bis-
cuit dough and dredge with flour.
Drain one quart of oysters, season
with salt, pepper and butter, pour into
the baking dish, adding some of the
oyster liquid, dredge with flour and
cover with a top crust, leaving a small
opening in the centre. Bake in a quick
oven.

OYSTERS ON TOAST.

Fry nice, large oysters with bacon
after having dipped them in egg and
cracker dust. Have ready some hot
buttered toast. Put three oysters on
each slice of toast and cover with
strips of crisp bacon. Season with a
little salt, pepper and a few drops of
lemon juice and serve very hot.

THE PIGEONS IN ST. JOHNS ARE CHUMMY

Probably no city in the Dominion
of Canada has as unique an attrac-
tion as St. John, the thriving city at
the mouth of the river of that name
that flows through the Province of
New Brunswick. When the visitor
steps off the train at any of the de-
pots he is amazed to find flocks of
various colored pigeons in the roads,
or picking around on the sidewalks.
They are so tame that they hardly
deign to swagger from the feet of the
pedestrians as they coax for some-
thing to eat.

They are the pride of the city.
King's Square is full of them, and
the children, as they play there, are
often in the centre of a flock of 150
of beautiful varied colored birds. They
eat out of the hands of anyone who
will bring them food. Their friends
are legion, for every day men and
women, as they pass to their occupa-
tions, drop peanuts or bread for the
perpetually hungry guests of the city.
When one sits down on a park seat
he is at once surrounded by a flock of
the pigeons, each begging for some-
thing. Produce a bag of peanuts or
cakes and they are on the seat, up on
the feeder's knees or his shoulder or
in his hand eagerly trying to eat the
food faster than he prepares it for
them. On cold or stormy days when
the crowds do not come with the
food, the birds are forced to shift for
themselves, and then they make a pil-
grimage to various back doors and res-
taurants, where experience has taught
them there is food to be found.

No one molests the birds; even
the dogs of the city seem to under-
stand that the pigeons of St. John
have their rights as well as they and
must not be injured. As a result they
have thrived greatly and have no
fear of man, dogs, children or any-
thing that is to be found in the street
of a big city.

CANADA THE POPULAR LAND OF PROMISE

The British Overseas Settlement
Committee, according to advices from
London, has received nearly 50,000
applications from ex-service men and
women for emigration to all parts of
the Empire. About one-fifth of the ap-
plicants are women who intend to
take up domestic or land work. Most
of the men desire to go on farms.
Canada is the favorite dominion. Be-
tween 6,000 and 7,000 applicants ex-
press a preference for this country,
while Australia, New Zealand and
South Africa are next in order of
popularity. With dependents the to-
tal involved is well over 100,000 per-
sons. The lists for ex-service men
close December 31 and applications
are now pouring in at the rate of 1,000
a week.

when captured German Guns will be presented to the city.

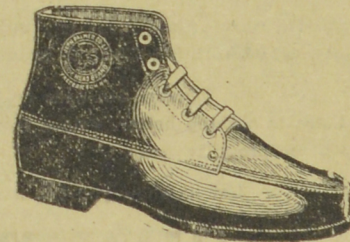
While the wearing of uniform is not essential, all in possession of uni-

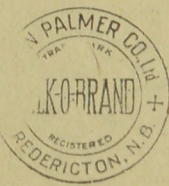
