## PRODUCTION OF WHEAT IN RUSSIA

Before the war, Russia was one of the principal wheat exporting countries, sending out annually approximately one hundred and forty million bushels of wheat, compared to average exports, in the years 1905-14, of one hundred and ten million bushels of wheat and flour from the United States, and seventy millions from Canada. Western and Central Europe drew from her a good portion of their imported cereals, and had to offset the loss of these supplies partly by reduced consumption, partly by buying larger amounts from North America where the bumper crops of recent years have made increased exports possible. The Western Hemisphere has had, in fact, practically a corner on wheat. Unless Russian supplies are forthcoming or the western crops are unusually large, wheat is likely to be scarce in the 1920-1921 season. The quantity of Russia's annual contribution has a strong influence on wheat prices, and has, therefore, always been of great interest to this country. The average reports on conditions in Russia have not been of a native to encourage belief in the existence of a large wheat supply there. These reports, however, have apparently not given an accurate situation.

A special British mission was recently sent to South Russia to investigate cereal production and supplies, for the information of the Supreme Economic Council. Their official report, which is published by the International Institute of Agriculture at Rome sums up the situation as follows:

Taking into account the wheat yield of 1919 and stocks from previous harvests, and allowing for the quantities required for consumption in South Russia, there remains a surplus available for export abroad; this surplus is estimated as certainly not less than 15,000,000 quintals (55,000,000 bushels.) These supplies are located mainly in the Ukraine, where the 1919 crop is estimated at 331,000,000 bushels, 60 million bushels over the 1909-1913 average.

Central and Northern Russia are short of supplies, but the breakdown of internal transportation facilities makes it impossible to ship to them the surplus crops of the south. Though the railways are no longer effective, the rivers still provide a means of transportation. The Don, Dniester and Dnieper all run through the main areas of the wheat belts to the Black Sea or the Sea of Azov. If it is exportable surplus can be moved via these to the port of Odessa on the Black Sea or to Rostov on the Sea of Azov, transport from there to western European markets would present no great difficulty.

## WILL SELL EX-KAISER'S STEIN

New York, May 17—Any one having the least possible use for a stein may go to the Anderson Galleries presently and bid for the ex-Kaiser's favorite beer mug. If there was that much good beer anywhere several quarts of it would fill in this gem of the collection of the former Emperor of the Germans, which is to be placed on view at the galleries tomorrow. It is in the Renaissance style, carved from a Siberian tusk, fabulously old and intricately decorated with a relief of the "Birth of Venus."

According to Mr. Povelson, who brought the collection here, this ivory stein was sometimes used by his recent majesty on state occasions, although its size and weight make it a formidable affair even when empty. It is empty now and will be sold empty upon its merits as a work of art, without side attractions.

## INFORMATION FOR LOVERS OF SUGAR

As sugar is becoming more scarce, let us try to make up the deficiency with a few "grains" of information on such a sweet subject:

The sugar-cane in some cases grows to a height of twenty feet.

Rum is made from some of the scum obtained from the boiling down of the juice from the sugar-cane.

Sugar is made in North America from the sugar-maple (Acer Saccharinum), a fine-looking forest tree. A hole is bored in the trunk during March or April—when the weather is frosty at night and sunny during the day—and the sap runs into a trough placed below. The manufacture of maple-sugar is carried on close to the trees, the process being called a "bee" (or picnic) by the Americans.

Palm-sugar, called "jaggery," is obtained in India from a species of palm-trees. The sweet juice flows from the top shoot of the tree when it is wounded.

Beet-sugar comes from the root of the beta (the beet root), and its manufacture had its rise in the exclusive Continental system set up by Napoleon, who forbade foreign produce to be used. By taxes he caused cane-sugar to rise to five shillings per pound. Thus the manufacture of beet-sugar became flourishing and gave employment to many thousands of people in France, Germany, and Russia.

Sugar candy is merely a variation in the preparation of sugar, being a freshly-boiled solution which, when taken to a hot room, forms large crystals upon sticks or strings put into the vat.

Sugar is said to have a beautiful influence upon the muscles, more so than on any other part of the body. In fact, some people have been known to eat a small quantity after muscular exertion in order to get back lost energy.
