OF INTEREST TO WOMEN

INFORMATION.

Grease spots on silk or velvet will disappear if rubbed rapidly but lightly with a clean cotton, dipped in chloroform. Finish with a dry cloth.

A few drops of ammonia on a cloth will clean finger-makes from windows and mirrors like magic.

Buy soap of all kinds in quantities—or at least several bars at a time, and place on shelf back of the range or in some other warm place to dry out before using. It will last nearly three times as long.

Potatoes that have been frost-bitten should be put in a dark place for a few days. They will decay if thawed in the open.

TEA APRONS.

In these maidless days the tea apron has again come to the foreground. A pretty one requires three-fourths of a yard of handkerchief linen. It has a deep yolk band of hand-crocheted fillet lace, and tied with pink satin strings. The crocheted pocket consists of a crocheted circle to match the yoke, turned over like a rever and finished with a picot edge. The edges of the apron are trimmed with the same hand picot.

IMPRESSIONS.

MARBLE CAKE.

One-third cup shortening, 1 cup sugar, 2 eggs, ½ cup milk, 3 level teaspoons baking powder, scant 1-3 cup cocoa, ¼ teaspoon salt, 1½ cups flour, ½ teaspoon each nutmeg and cinnamon, 1 teaspoon vanilla. Cream sugar and shortening; add eggs well beaten flour sifted with baking powder and salt, alternately with milk. Add vanilla. Turn one-third of batter in bowl and add cocoa and spices. Pour into greased pan, alternating light and dark mixture to give it a marbled appearance. Bake 40 to 45 minutes in a moderate oven.

CARAMEL PIE.

Stir ½ cup of granulated sugar over the fire until melted and brown, add 2 tablespoons of water and when well mixed add slowly 1 pint of hot milk. Stir until well blended, cool, add 3 well beaten eggs and a teaspoon of vanilla, turn into a pie plate lined with paste and bake until firm in the center.

MOCK CHICKEN.

Two cups cooked beans, 1½ cups stale bread crumbs, 2 tablespoonfuls butterine, ¾ cup milk, ¾teaspoonful salt.
Press beans through fine strainer. Add milk. Arrange alternate layers of bean pulp and buttered crumbs in baking dish. Cover with crumbs. Bake 45 minutes. Serve with tomato sauce.

SURPRISE FOR WAR VETERANS

CANADIANS WERE GOOD, SAY YANKS

New York, May 17—Six members of the American hockey team of 11 players, which took part in the Olympic games at Antwerp, arrived on the steamship Monogolia from Southampton. The party consisted of Capt. J. W. McCormick, Lawrence McCormick, Raymond L. Bonney and Herbert Drury, all of Pittsburgh; Cyril Widenbomer of St. Paul and Francis Synnot of Boston.

Captain McCormick said: "The Canadians, who beat us two goals to nothing, are a fine lot of men, and we have no complaints or excuse to make for our defeat."

"Capt. Frederickson of the Canadian team told us that we were the only ones who had thrown a 'scare' into his players. Both sides knew that the team first to score would be the ultimate winner. Neither side scored in the first half of the deciding game and we had been playing for fully 10 minutes in the second half when a lucky shot from a scrimmage scored a goal for our opponents. That was the beginning of the end."

"The utmost goodfellowship prevailed between the teams," he continued. "Big crowds attended all the games and the whole series was a great success. There was some difficulty in securing suitable referees, but we had no complaint on that account. Our men found the rink, which was well appointed and brilliantly lighted, a bit too small. The playing floor of ice measured 180 by 62 feet while at home in Pittsburgh we were accustomed to a space measuring 270 by 100 feet."

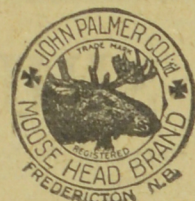
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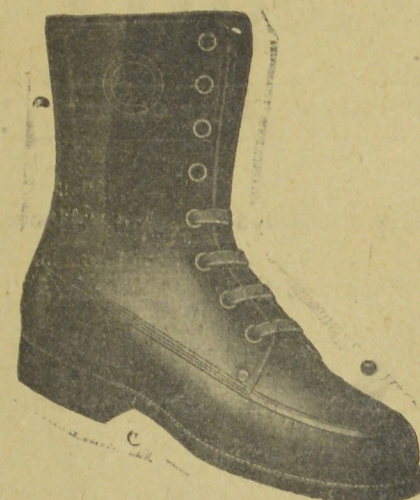

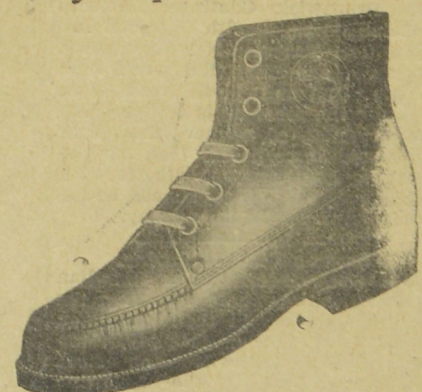
