MARBLE CAKE.

One-third cup shortening, 1 cup suar, 2 eggs, 1/2 cup milk, 3 level teaspoons baking powder, scant 1-3 cup ocoa, ¼ teaspoon salt, 1¾ cups flour, 2 teaspoon each nutmeg and cinnanon, 1 teaspoon vanilla. Cream sugar and shortening; add eggs well beaten flour sifted with baking powder and alt, alternately with milk. Add vanila. Turn one-third of batter in bowl and add cocoa and spices. Pour into greased pan, alternating light and dark mixture to give it a marbled appearance. Bake 40 to 45 minutes in a moderate oven.

CARAMEL PIE.


