A FEW TRIED AND TRUE
PICKLE RECIPES

Mustard Pickles.

They make mustard pickles in the
following way up New York State:

One quart small cucumbers, one
quart small onions, one quart green
tomatoes cut in small squares, one
quart cauliflower, one quart string
beans, four green peppers. Soak over
night in brine, heat up in the brine
to boiling point, then drain and cover
with the following sauce: Heat two
quarts of vinegar, into this stir a paste
made of one cup sugar, one cup flour,
one-half pound mustard. Place in jars
while hot.

Mystery Pickles

Run one peck of green tomatoes, six
medium sized onions and nine small
green peppers through the meat chop-
per. Stir in a cup of salt and let stand
twenty-four hours. Drain, put on vine-
gar enough to cover and cook half an
hour. Add one-half pint vinegar one-
half pound of sugar, two tablespoons
ground mustard mixed with a little
vinegar, two tablespoons celery seed,
one teaspoon each of allspice, cinna-
mon and cloves, and one-half pint grad-
ed horseradish. Bottle.

Cooked Piccalilli.

Twenty-five large sweet peppers,
half green and half red, eighteen med-
ium sized white onions, one quart
vinegar, two cups granulated sugar,
one tablespoon salt. Peel onions, re-
move seed and stems from peppers
and chop fine. Mix all together and
boil until tender. Bottle while hot and
keep airtight.

Milk Jelly.

To make milk jelly. Soak two table-
spoonfuls of gelatine in one half cup
of cold milk for three minutes. Heat
four cups of milk to the boiling point
and pour over the gelatine, adding
half a cup of sugar and flavoring with
vanilla. Place in individual moulds to
cool. Serve in sherbet glasses with
whipped cream on the top and a little
rich preserves; peach is very nice.

Cocoanut Rice.

One cup of boiled rice, half a pint
of cream, one cup of grated cocoanut,
half a cup sugar, and vanilla flavor-
ing. Whip the cream, add the rice,
cocoanut and sugar with flavoring.
Place in sherbet glasses with a little
extra cocoanut sprinkled over the top
and a maraschino cherry.

For Dessert.

A cocoanut may be kept some time
after it has been opened if in a cool
place, and when grated fresh is a
nice finish to a dessert that may seem
quite plain without it.

Jelly Roll.

Three eggs one cup of sugar, one
half tablespoonful of milk, one fourth
teaspoon of salt, one level teaspoon
baking powder, one cup flour, one
tablespoon melted butter. Line the
bottom of pan with paper and spread
mixture evenly and bake in a quick
oven. When baked turn on a paper
sprinkled with powdered sugar.
Spread quickly with jelly and roll.
Roll paper around the cake to keep
it in shape.

erington, have called a convention for
Thursday at Gagetown.

In Restigouche a convention has
been called for Tuesday, September
21, to select candidates for the ap-
proaching contest.

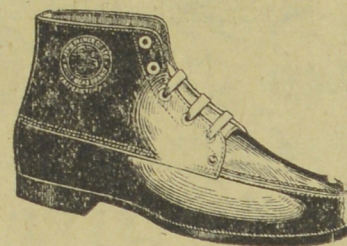
