DECIDING N. B. H. L. MATCHES WILL BE PLAYED HERE THIS WEEK; CHATHAM STOCK DOWN

Two Defeats for North Shore Team Will Give Fredericton a Firm Grip on the Chestnut Cup—An Even Break will Give Chatham a Good Chance for the Title—Both Fredericton and Marysville Will be at Full Strength.

DECIDING SIXW-P-S....

This week will see the crucial matches of the New Brunswick Hockey League. They will be between Chatham and Fredericton on Wednesday night and Chatham and Marysville on Thursday night. Almost anything can happen in the league standing as the result of these matches. If the North Shore team loses both it will give Fredericton an almost sure grip on the Chestnut Cup. If Chatham breaks even it will have a chance for the title. If the visiting team wins both it might as well take the cup away with it. The even break has possibilities. If it should be Fredericton to lose and

Marysville to win Marysville will finish the league with an even break all round but Fredericton will drop to second place with a hard row to hoe in its foreign games. If Fredericton should win but Marysville lose the city team still would have a hard fight for the cup with Chatham having the advantage of playing the deciding game on its home ice.

Big Crowds Expected

With so much depending on the results the biggest crowds in years are expected to attend both games at the Arctic Rink. Hockey has already shown marked signs of revival this season and attendance at matches has been good but all season's records should be smashed Wednesday and Thursday nights.

Special Preparations

Manager George Beatty is making special preparations for a large attendance. Six ticket booths will be provided and arrangements made for lines to be formed so as to facilitate the sale of tickets.

Chatham's Stock is Down

Chatham's stock has gone down since the game in which it defeated Marysville 7 to 3 last week. Marysville had a team weaker than that which beat Bathurst the next night, according to the fans Chatham should have made a better showing.

Full Strength Team

Fredericton will present a full strength team it is expected. The U. N. B. contingent which has done the "heft" of the scoring all season will be on hand. Acadia is to play here next week in the Intercollegiate League but it is believed that the college players can recover from the strain of a match against Chatham in the intervening week. Marysville also will represent a team as strong as possible. It is considered quite possible that the North Shore team will go away with two defeats.

PAY IN CANADIAN WANT CHANGE IN AMERICAN COIN

New York, Feb. 14—One of the peculiar angles about the use of Canadian money at the box offices of three local theatres developed during the lunch hour at the Longacre Theatre. At a quarter after 12 a gentleman, who introduced himself as a resident of Toronto asked for two orchestra seats for "Adam and Eve" and gave in return a \$20 Canadian bill. The Treasurer, without thinking of the financial problem involved gave him his tickets and \$14.50 in American money. Not until after the stranger had disappeared with the tickets and the change did Treasurer Munster do a little figuring. He called up his bank and found that the \$20 Canadian bill was worth exactly \$16 in American money at the bank. In other words the stranger got two theatre tickets worth \$5.50 for the sum of \$1.50. The mistake of course lay in the fact that Munster gave full American money in change when the original announcement stipulated that Canadian money would be taken in full value only in payment of tickets and any change naturally would be figured on the basis of 80 cents to the dollar, the same as any bank would discount Canadian money.

News of the liberality of the Treasurer at the Longacre later in the day led to the presentation of a \$50 Canadian bill, with the request for two seats. Mr. Munster laid out the change and began to figure it, when the customer very indignantly said he would not take the tickets at all unless he received full change in American money. Inasmuch as this meant presenting the stranger with two tickets worth \$5.50 and giving him \$44.50 in addition, when the \$50 bill was worth only \$40 at any bank, Mr. Munster regretfully cancelled the order.

Just how Comstock and Gest will come out on the transaction of taking Canadian money on its face value is not known, but it is understood that Morris Gest, who is in Canada with the "Chu Chin Chow" Company has instructed the theatres to send all the Canadian money they can take in to him at Ottawa.

S.S. YARMOUTH AWAY WITH BOOZE CARGO

The Black Star steamship Yarmouth started yesterday on her storm belated trip to Havana with vast stores of American booze computed to be worth according to the point of view of the computer, between \$1,000,000 and \$5,000,000 and thirty-four negro passengers.

On her first effort to reach Havana the Yarmouth was disabled off the Jersey coast and towed back to New York. She may run afoul of a howling hurricane in her present trip as the Weather Bureau announced yesterday that there was one dervishing over northwest Florida bound up the coast.

The Yarmouth's departure gave joy to the Federal prohibition enforcers who have been guarding her to see that none of her cargo got ashore surreptitiously. Twenty agents in two reliefs of ten men each have been watching the ship since she docked and the work has cost Uncle Sam \$100 a day.

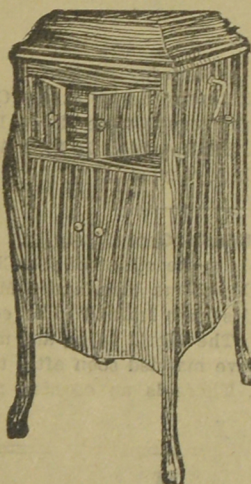

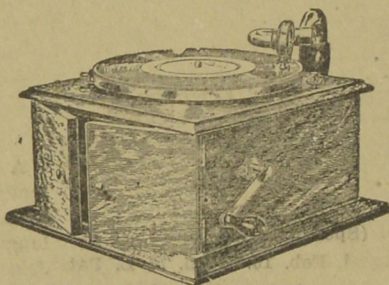
