Wallace and Bruce

Q—Would you be kind enough to let me know what religion Robert the Bruce and William Wallace belonged to and what great battles they took part in?—A. B.

A—Both Sir William Wallace (1270-1305), and King Robert the Bruce (1274-1329), the celebrated Scottish patriots, were devout Christians and members of the Catholic Church, owing allegiance to the Vatican at Rome. Mass was celebrated on the field of

Bannockburn, the entire Scottish army on its knees. The principal battles Wallace took part in were Falkirk, Sterling, Bridge and Campsie. The most important engagements in which Bruce took part were the battles of Methven Wood, Strathfillan, Loudoun Hill, Inverurie, Pass of Brander and Bannockburn.

St. Valentine

Q—Please give me an outline of the history of St. Valentine.—Mrs. D. W.

A—There are at least three different Saint Valentines, all of them martyrs, mentioned in the early martyrologies under the date of February 14. One is described as a priest at Rome, another as Bishop of Interamna (the modern term). These two seem to have suffered in the second half of the third century and to have been buried on the Flaminian Way, but at different distances from the city. In William of Malmesbury's time what was known to the ancients as the Flaminian Gate of Rome, and is now the Porta del Popolo, was called the Gate of St. Valentine. The name seems to have been taken from a small church dedicated to the saint which was in the immediate neighborhood. Of the third St. Valentine who suffered in Africa with a number of companions, nothing further is known.

"Sky-Born Music"

Q—A few years ago I read a passage from Emerson—if my memory serves me—in one of the Ontario Golden Rule Books, part of which ran: "Wherever I go I hear a sky-born music still. It is not only in the rose." I am unable to find this in my copy of Emerson's Poems. Can you give me the name of the poem containing it, if it is by Emerson? Mount Everest

Q—Will you kindly state in what part of the world Mount Everest is and how high the mountain is? Also, why is it called by that name?—M. J. B.

A—Mount Everest, the highest mountain in the world, is a peak of the Himalayas situated in the province of Nepal, in the northern part of India. Its elevation, as at present determined by trigonometrical observation, is 29,002 feet, but it is possible that further investigation into the value of refraction at such altitudes will result in placing the summit even higher. It is named after Sir George Everest (1790-1866), the greatest of Indian surveyors, and the founder of the Indian survey.

Each tender must be accompanied by an accepted cheque on a chartered bank equal to ten per cent of the total amount of the tender and payable to the order of the Minister of Public Works, Canada, and the State Highway Commission, Maine, jointly, as a guarantee that the tenderer will execute the contract within ten days of the award and furnish a satisfactory bond amounting to one-half of the contract price for the faithful performance of the work.

The cheque will be forfeited should the tenderer fail to enter into a contract when called upon to do so, and returned if the tender is not accepted.


