UNITED FARMERS HELD ORGANIZATION MEETING

A Province Wide Campaign Has Been Inaugurated—Meetings Arranged for the Different Counties of the Province—The Sum of Five Hundred and Fifty Dollars Subscribed—Farmers Showing Activity.

Woodstock, Aug. 16—In the parent home of the United Farmers organization it was fitting that the first gun of the provincial wide organization campaign be fired here. During the day farmers were arriving by automobile from all sections of the country and in nearly every case were accompanied by their wives and daughters who are apparently deeply interested in the movement. The meeting was held on the grand stand at Connell Park which owing to the intense heat was an ideal spot for the purposes intended. The speeches were not lengthy but were full of enthusiasm and determination. The usual air of buzzing excitement was noticeably absent and in its place there seemed to be a quite business like method and a plan of campaign without any fire works.

There were about four hundred present when the meeting was called to order by W. R. Reed of Knoxford, who presided and his sharp incisive remarks during the proceedings met with general approval. Gordon Sharp, the provincial secretary, referred to the growth of the association and dwelt particularly on the need of organized effort to carry out the aims of the movement.

Some of the legislation at the last session of parliament was taken up by T. W. Caldwell, M. P., dealing especially with the order-in-council granting credits to Greece and Roumania of fifty million dollars which he said went to purchase goods from government members who sold at war time prices. He also went into the ship building credits amounting to twenty million dollars and in both cases he felt that the tax payers of Canada would have to pay the bills.

John M. Pratt of Winnipeg, a member of the Canadian council of agriculture in a brief speech dealt with organization matters.

The county organization was then formed with the following officers: President, S. J. Burlock; secretary-treasurer, J. E. Tedford; executive committee, Frank J. Shaw, Wakefield; George Robinson, Brighton; Rennie Tracy, Wicklow; Guy Dow, Northampton; W. M. Page, Wilmet; Byron Bull, Woodstock; Earl Cameron, Peel; Odbur Shaw, Simonds; Eber Spence, Aberdeen; Almon Hanson, Richmond.

In order to start and carry on the campaign contributions were asked for and five hundred and fifty dollars were contributed.

The speakers who will conduct the organization of the provincial association are: John M. Pratt of Winnipeg, C. Gordon Sharp, provincial secretary; T. W. Caldwell, M. P., president of the N. B. Association. The programme arranged tonight by the executive committee follows: York county, August 17, Fredericton; Sunbury county, August 18, Oromocto; Queens county, August 19, Lower Gagetown; Kings county, August 20, Sussex; Charlotte county, August 23, St. Stephen (in the town council chamber); Westmorland county, August 24, Moncton; Albert county, August 25, Albert in the Oulton Hall; Kent county, August 26; Northumberland county, August 27, Blackville in the Blackville Hall; Gloucester county, August 28, Bathurst in the Masconic Hall; Restigouche county, August 30, Charlo in Co-operative Store, Audience Hall; Madawaska county, August 31; Victoria county, September 16.

PAPER MILL PURCHASED

Quebec Aug. 16—One of the biggest pulp and paper transactions effected in the province of Quebec for some time was brought to a close on Saturday when the ownership of the Gulf Pulp and Paper Company passed to English companies in which Viscount Northcliff and Viscount Rothenmere are included.

The actual sum involved is not known, but that it reaches several million dollars is not improbable. So soon as the deal was put through a new board of directors was elected, consisting of Frank W. Clarke, of Quebec, J. A. Cameron, of Montreal, and Kenneth KKK MacKenzie, of New York.
