NO DANGER OF A FAMINE IN SUGAR

(New York Herald)

Raw sugar prices continued yesterday to slump, and traders said the end was not in sight. One thing is certain. The ubgaboo of a sugar famine, with the consumer paying 50 cents a pound next winter, has been dispelled by the unprecedented decline. Fifteen cents a pound retail this fall, with a probable further reduction when the new Cuban crop is available in December, was predicted yesterday by sugar merchants and refiners.

The sudden collapse of the market is the direct result of conditions arising from the shortage last spring, according to a well posted sugar man. The confectionery trade, chain grocery stores and other large consumers being unable to buy from the refiners contracted for shipments from Java, Formosa, China, Brazil, Argentina, Holland and other foreign countries. The bulk of this foreign sugar is coming in now.

The price broke two weeks ago and has been tobogganing ever since, setting a new record for fluctuations in the sugar market. A week ago raw sugar sold at 16.30 cents a pound; Next week it would surprise no one in the trade to see the price fall below 10 cents which would mark a new low record for 1920.

The price of refined sugar has begun to reflect the downward trend and one large refiner already has marked his wholesale price down from 21.10 cents to 17.10 cents a pound. Retailers, who have hoped to get from 25 to 30 cents a pound for stock they paid 20 to 22 cents for, are getting panicky and unloading at the price they paid or less.

One East Side dealer with a big supply to dispose of loaded his delivery wagons with five pound packages yesterday and sent them out on the street at \$1 a package. Careful housewives, who had been hoarding ten or twenty pounds of sugar against the day when the price might soar beyond their purse, are beginning to dip into their reserves, and this also had an effect on the price.

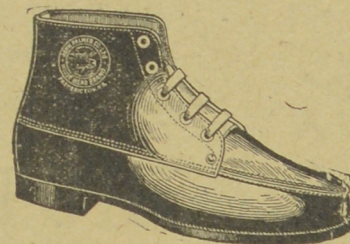

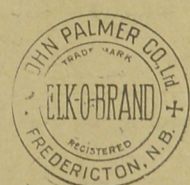
