J. D. Tothill, of this city, who is in the Entomological Service of the Dominion Department of Agriculture, has gone to British Columbia where he will spend six weeks. His trip to the Pacific Coast is not for pleasure, however, but for the purpose of obtaining special information concerning the spruce bud worm in that province.

The Spruce Bud Worm is not a stranger to New Brunswick having caused extensive damage in the forests of the province several years past. The Entomological Service has been investigating this pest for some time.

Corn Borer in Ontario

W. P. Keenan, also with the local laboratory of the Entomological Service, also left on a special work. He will be in the Province of Ontario for some time investigating the ravages of the European Corn Borer, which made its appearance in that province. This insect is well known in the United States for its depredations. So far it is not widespread in Canada, but the Department is trying to confine its ravages to an area as small as possible.

RICHARDS MFG. PAYS LARGEST SUM IN PROVINCE

TOTAL OF \$160,000
BATHURST LUMBER CO.

Three Quarters of Million Dollars already received—
Total Receipts will be
Largest on Record.

The Department of Lands and Mines has received so far three quarters of a million dollars as stumpage, mileage and fire tax. Payments still are being made and it is believed that the total revenue will be about double that of last year.

Of the \$750,000 already received by the Department \$628,000 was from stumpage. The payments into the Provincial Treasury this year will be the largest on record because of an increased rate of stumpage together with a large cut of lumber on Crown Lands.

Largest Contributors

The largest contributor to the Provincial Treasury through the Crown Lands, is The Richards Manufacturing Company, of Campbellton, which pays \$160,000. The Bathurst Lumber Company, of Bathurst, is second, paying \$155,000.

Other large payments are made as follows: Shives Lumber Company, Campbellton, \$97,000; J. B. Snowball Company, Limited, Chatham, \$74,000; Fraser Companies, Limited, Edmundston, \$65,000.

Numerous other companies and operators pay into the Department the amounts gradually scaling down money is coming in steadily.

Wilson, Chief Inspector for New Brunswick under The Intoxicating Liquor Act, 1916, will leave this evening for St. Leonard to investigate the theft of seven casks of alcohol of a lot of eight which were in a C. P. R. freight car there awaiting shipment to Fredericton for storage with other seized liquor. The Chief Inspector will devote his own energies to this case. The C. P. R., which was responsible for the goods, already has been at work on the case. Detectives Outlow and Leggett, of the railway service, have been at work for some days. Developments are expected at any time.

Reunion of the 236th

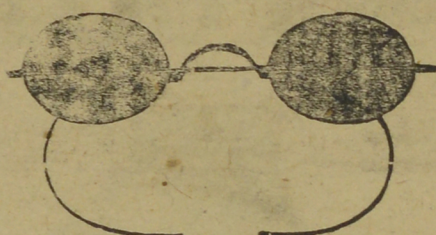

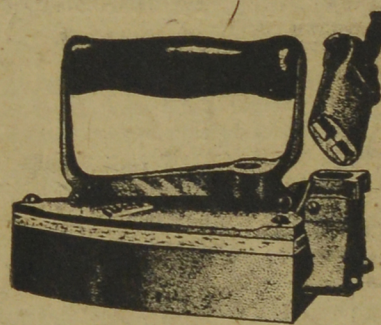
