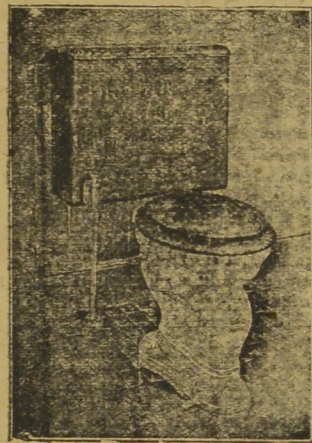

THE REMARKABLE MAGNETISM OF MR. DAVID LLOYD GEORGE

The Premier is Not an Orator of the John Bright Stamp, and Gladstone Towered Above Him in Intellectual Capacity—On Great Occasions He is a Sight for Gods and Men.

(Character sketch of David Lloyd George, British Premier, written for Cross-Atlantic Newspaper Service, by one of England's most prominent newspaper men. Mr. Cave has been in close touch with Mr. Lloyd George for the past fifteen years, and has had unequalled opportunities for studying the fascinating personality of Britain's leading statesman.)

London, Sept. 7.—At one of the vital crises of the war Lloyd George made a speech in Paris which caused a sensation throughout Europe, consternation amongst a section of the British Cabinet, and bitter condemnation from his critics in the House of Commons. It was a speech which might have been made by a Prime Minister deliberately riding for a fall.

After making that speech, Lloyd George returned to England and went down to the House without appreciable delay. During the first ten minutes of his deliverance, he was listened to in chilling silence; during the second ten minutes he aroused an occasional "Hear, hear," and sometimes a suggestion—never more than a suggestion—of applause; at the end of the third ten minutes the House was aroused to enthusiasm. When he sat down the British House of Commons went mad. Members stood upon the historic green benches waving anything they could lay their hands on, cheering themselves hoarse. The scene lasted several minutes, and the House had not fully recovered its normal composure when it resumed its deliberations the following day.

How did he do it. What is the secret of the remarkable domination which the Prime Minister is able to wield over the British people?

A Great Man

Lloyd George is not an orator in the sense that John Bright and Charles Bradlaugh were orators. Gladstone towered above him in intellectual capacity. Asquith and Balfour are far greater Parliamentarians. Upon ordinary issues even Bonar Law, with his Scotch shrewdness, pawky humor, an indirectness of attack, will often succeed where the Prime Minister arouses only suspicion and anger. But upon great occasions with his back to the wall Lloyd George is a sight for Gods and men.

A good many years ago I used to attend regularly the sittings of the London County Council in the early days when the Progressive party waged a holy crusade against the squalor and social inequalities of the Empire's capital city. John Burns was then, as he is now, an intimate personal friend. One day Burns called me down to introduce me to a distinguished American visitor in the person of William Jennings Bryan. I met Bryan and couldn't get away from him. He held me like a magnet. His personality was over-powering and all compelling. I couldn't get away from William Jennings Bryan.

And you can't get away from Lloyd George. You couldn't get away from Charles Bradlaugh. You can get away, quite easily, from Asquith; and Balfour, and Bonar Law. Even Gladstone did not compel you all the time. I suppose there were never two men whose views upon the fundamental things of life and death were more dissimilar than those of Lloyd George and Charles Bradlaugh. Yet Lloyd George emanates that indefinable something which can only be expressed in a trite phrase such as "the force of magnetic personality," just as Charles Bradlaugh did, and as, from my experience, William Jennings Bryan does.

Lloyd George is the most approachable man I know. In the privacy of his

own room, either at Downing Street or the House of Commons, he talks to you as though you were the man whose views he wishes to ascertain, and respect, above all others. He talks to an audience in exactly the same way. In a great gathering of thousands every individual man feels that the British Prime Minister is appealing to him. His language is terse and simple, and his sentences are short, but seldom jerky. If a man in the audience interrupts him he answers him back, and he usually scores, but is never drawn away from the point he is seeking to establish.

Of the things that go to make up Lloyd George's personality, a generous measure of mysticism is one. Love of rugged nature is another. His smiles are of mountains, valleys, rivers, streams, and the sun breaking through the clouds. He is a passionate patriot of his native Wales. He is fond of music, can sing, and likes to be sung to. Not long ago it was credibly reported that vocal selections by the "Brothers Geddies" were amongst the relaxations that pleased him most.

For tradition, precedent, and custom the British Prime Minister has no use. When John Burns became President of the Local Government Board, he disgusted the porter at his office door by allowing the entree to visitors wearing other head gear than silk hats. Lloyd George's Government is, with a few aristocratic exceptions, a Government of "soft felt." The working men of England were gratified beyond measure when their Prime Minister left London for Spa, to settle the affairs of Europe, smoking a briar pipe filled with quite ordinary tobacco.
