## A PROGRESSIVE GOVERNMENT.

In commenting on the able and businesslike speech delivered by Premier Foster at the opening of the St. John exhibition the St. John Times says:

"When the last exhibition was held in St. John Hon. W. E. Foster was a director of the Association, but he was not premier of the province. At the opening of the fair on Saturday he was able to speak as premier and tell of notable things accomplished by his government. He touched upon only a few of them, but even if he had referred only to the development of water powers it would have been enough to show that progress is the watchword of the administration. It is not easy to exaggerate what this development will mean to New Brunswick, and the premier's announcement that it will not be very many months before power is turned on at Musquash is hailed with the greatest satisfaction by St. John people. Apart from the development of Musquash, Lepreaux, the Nepisiguit and Shogomac, there is the further assurance referred to by Hon. Mr. Tweed that the present owners of Grand Falls property must get busy or get out.

"Premier Foster also alluded to the crown lands policy of the government, and re-affirmed the policy of conservation which it inaugurated, and which has been of such enormous benefit to the province. A very significant and welcome reference was that to the oil shales of New Brunswick, indicating as it does that the government sees in their development a great opportunity to increase the wealth of the province, and feels that the people would endorse constructive action to bring about that result at an early date."

The St. John Standard says there was partisan propaganda in the speeches of Premier Foster and his ministers delivered at the opening of the St. John exhibition. Readers of the Standard's report of the premier's remarks would scarcely get the idea that there was anything of a partisan nature spoken. The report occupied just two lines and was as follows: "The chairman next called upon Premier Foster for a few words." If the Standard wants people to believe its statement it should have trotted out the proof in the form of a report of the premier's speech. As the case now stands one might get the idea that the Standard itself is guilty of partisanship. Whatever the premier may have said he undoubtedly spoke the truth and the truth is what the Standard wants to conceal from the public.

The suggestion was made at the council meeting last evening that the City Engineer prepare a statement showing the cost per yard of the work of paving Charlotte street. This is information that is wanted by the citizens and the suggestion will be carried out. Scarcity of cement and unfavorable weather have hampered the work on the streets, and it will be near the end of the month before Charlotte street is ready for traffic. A good job is being done and the public should be given some idea as to the cost.

"All in all, the bountiful harvest now being garnered," says The Brockville Recorder, "will enable the Dominion to look forward to the coming winter with the assurance that while there may be areas of depression here and there, no general collapse of business prosperity need be feared. In the topsy-turvy world of today few nations have a better outlook than Canada, the well-being of which is based firmly upon the fertility of her boundless fields."


