IMPORTANT MATTERS BEFORE CITY COUNCIL

been interviewed by Captain Le Royer of the Canadian Air Board, and his requests that this be a municipal air harbor and that the Council eventually control the fees as harbor fees. A nominal fee of \$10 must be paid by the city, and from there on the city collects the anchorage or wharfage fees as in any harbor. Buoys are to be put out in the spring and taken up in the fall, according to the new scheme, and outside of this their is no expense at all. The city is to communicate with the Air Board and apply for a license and Ald. Cooper made the motion, and Ald. Cain seconded it.

The Bathing Beach

Ald. Jennings reported a visit to the bathing houses, and stated that he found them in a very filthy condition. The City Engineer, has had these houses removed, and considering the lateness in the season, they will not be replaced.

A further report of the work for next year's work will be made at the next meeting.

A petition from G. N. C. Hawkins, manager of the Bank of Montreal, was read asking for a reduction in taxes. He stated that the Board of Assessors refused to alter the taxes and Mr. Hawkins declares that he is dissatisfied with the amount and asked a reduction be made. He stated the amount of business, value of real estate, etc.

Ald. Neill moved that the petition be left to the Appeals Contingencies Committee, and that it be gone into with the manager of the branch and the city solicitor, and report back to the Council.

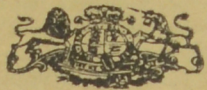

Maintaining posts and lines after the city put them shape, \$20.00 per mile per year. The lines amount to about 15 miles, hence \$300.00.

Installing switchboard, instruments and lighting arrester, \$125.00.

Street Improvements

Ald. Cooper stated that the city did not have at present enough trap rock to fulfill the probable demand and moved that the City Clerk call for tenders for 200 tons of good sandstone to be delivered at the city yards, delivery to start within one week.

Mr. McDowell stated that as R. T. Baird had not been able to fill his contract as rapidly as possible, he declared that first-class hard blue sandstone would be considered very good for a base with a trap rock covering.

Ald. Cooper stated that Charlotte Street will be completed this year, and that for the time blocks below and above York Street or Brunswick Street, he thought good sandstone should do. He thought it would be more economical and would facilitate work.

Mr. Baird can deliver sandstone much quicker than he can trap rock.

Ald. Cooper moved that the Finance Committee be instructed to dispose of sufficient Permanent Street bonds to raise funds to carry on this work for this year, the said bonds to be offered on a basis not exceeding 6 per cent.

Ald. Cooper brought up the matter of purchasing a new stone crusher.

Ald. Neill moved that as far as Charlotte Street is concerned, the auditor be requested to go over the accounts and determine exactly the cost of the street per yard to date and the estimated cost on completion.

Ald. Cain seconded the motion. The City Engineer stated that there were over 15,000 yards in the new road on Charlotte Street.

In explanation Ald. Neill stated that this be done that all may be satisfied in their own minds that the city is doing the work cheaper than by contract.

Mr. McDowell stated that the cost of a good up-to-date crusher would be \$9,000, and that the time to order was in the fall. Whether the building of the roads was done by the city or by contract, a crusher would be necessary, as any contractor taking the job would be in need of one, and it could be turned over at practically the price paid.

Ald. Cooper moved, seconded by Ald. Jennings, that the Engineer and Roads and Streets Committee be authorized to purchase a stone crusher with a capacity of 200 tons, Canadian made, if suitable and available.

Ald. Cooper reported on the matter of the City Hall—agreement with Mr. F. G. Spencer, of St. John. A payment of \$600 has recently been made and Spencer has agreed to take the City Hall for a two year term. He does not think that the city should hold his \$1,000 for the six months agreed on, and also thinks that his agreement to take the Opera House should release his \$1,000. \$2,100 worth of repairs and improvements have been made already in the Opera House by Mr. Spencer. The matter will come up at the special meeting.

The Council adjourned to the Council Chamber at 11 p.m.
