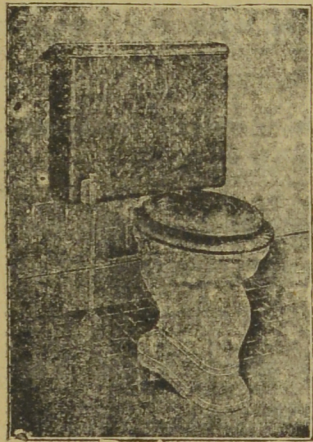

## ROY VOLO WON THE 2.12 MIXED CLASS ON OPENING DAY AFTER FIVE HEATS OF GOOD RACING

Fredericton Horse Displayed Great Reserve Powers — Best

Time was 2.12—Bad Smash in First Heat of 2.27 Pace—

Driver L. R. Seeley Thrown and Severely Bruised — May

Grattan Fell and Started Mixup—Forefeather Went Curious Heat in the 2.25 Trot.

Twelve heats were required to finish Tuesday's card in the Autumn Meet of the Fredericton track and incidentally the last heat went rather near sunset which was at 6.28. The racing produced some good heats and in the very first heat a mixup which resulted in two drivers being hurt and one horse distanced.

Roy Volo justified the confidence which Fredericton followers of the track have shown in him, winning the 2.12 Pace after two heats had gone to the fast Aroostook mare Little Anna S. Quiddnessett after being sixth in the first heat of the 2.27 Pace on account of being in the spill went out and took the race in three heats. Miss Peter Splan won the 2.25 Trot in three heats straight.

### The Smash Up.

The smash up came in the first heat of the 2.27. At the first quarter May Grattan the entry of the Faulkner stable of Montreal fell. Quiddnessett piled on top of her and Helen T. went over May Grattan's sulky. L. R. Seeley who was driving Quiddnessett received the worst injuries. He was thrown some distance and was very much shaken up and bruised about the body. His injuries were attended to and he was later taken from the track in a car. May Grattan was distanced but Quiddnessett was placed sixth. P. S. won this heat and looked a winner in the second until he was almost at the wire. Grover McCoy drove him from the start. Quiddnessett was going well and nosed the local entry out. P. S. was right in the race in the next two heats although only placed third. Helen T. was second in the third heat but in the fourth spoiled what chances she had by going twice to standstill breaks.

### The Race of the Day.

The 2.12 provided the excitement of the day. From the start it looked to be between Little Anna S. and Roy Volo. The Aroostook horse had the speed to take the first two heats. The Volo horse had a second and a third to his credit for these heats but in the third went out and won in 2.12 the fastest time and held his lead. The fifth heat drawn after the third heat. Blanche H. made it a race in the fourth but Roy Volo was going better all the time and held his lead. The fifth heat was called with only two starters Blanche H. being ruled out. Roy Volo

got away to a good start and never was even hard pressed by Little Anna S. which evidently did not have the staying qualities which the local horse possessed. Roy Volo captured first and fourth money.

### Ran Almost Whole Mile.

The first heat of the 2.25 Trot produced a curious incident. Forefeather a St. John horse broke on the first turn and never regained his stride, running the rest of the mile. His owner O'Keefe who was up did not seem to know that the horse was running. He finished first and was set back. Gray drove him the other heats. There was much scoring in this race Forefeather and Miss Peter Splan making trouble. Miss Peter Splan was good enough to take the race in straight heats. In the third heat Forefeather went a good heat but failed in the stretch.

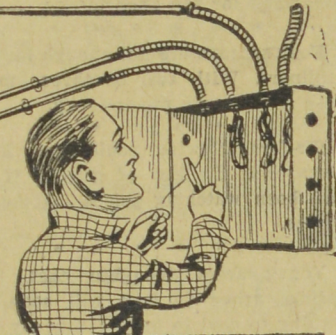
