## AN OUTSIDE VIEW

In commenting editorially on the dissolution of the New Brunswick Legislature the Sydney N. S. Record has this to say:

"The Government came into office in the spring of 1917. The chief issue in the campaign which preceded the Ministry's formation was the corrupt course which had been persisted in by the Conservative Government first led by Sir Douglas Hazen, then by Hon. J. K. Flemming; then by the late Hon. George Clark, and, at the time of its defeat, by Hon. James A. Murray. Corruption of the most glaring and most audacious character was clearly proven and the Conservatives who swept the field in the general election of 1912, were able to elect only a minority of the new House of Assembly in 1917.

"Hon. Walter E. Foster, who had the novel experience of entering as Premier a legislative body in which he had never before sat, has, on the whole, given New Brunswick efficient administration. His methods have been clean and straightforward, and it has not always been as skillful politically as men who had long been experienced in governmental and legislative affairs he has had the other—and greater—merit of strictly applying business principles to public business. The different governmental departments, which reeked with dishonesty under the Conservative Government, have been conducted honorably and successfully. The Liberal Ministry has done especially well in handling the highways problem and in putting on a proper basis the administration of the Crown lands—New Brunswick's major source of revenue."

The editor of Toronto Saturday Night in a letter to The Mail says that his published statement that Lord Beaverbrook was born at Maple, Ontario, was made on the authority of "His Lordship and is undoubtedly correct. This will be a rude shock to those who have always been under the impression that Lord Beaverbrook was a native of Beaverbrook, Northumberland County, New Brunswick. This province has claimed him as her son just as she claims Mr. Bonar Law the Chancellor of the exchequer. Perhaps our old friend Commodore Stewart, a staunch admirer of His Lordship may be able to hand Saturday Night some information on the subject. At any rate The Mail feels safe in leaving the case in his hands, and will abide by his decision. If Lord Beaverbrook was born in Ontario, he is certainly not a native of New Brunswick.

St. John Globe: Dr. W. C. Crockett one of the representatives of York county in the lately dissolved Legislature, announces his retirement from active political life in a letter, which also records his disapproval of opposition leadership and direction. Dr. Crockett declares they have not respected and upheld the principles of responsible government. The administration of public affairs in all its branches would be better if public men kept uppermost in their thoughts the principles of responsible government.

The friends of the provincial government in York will meet in convention at the Knights of Pythias Hall, Queen Street, at two o'clock on Saturday afternoon to select candidates for the Legislative Assembly. Friends of the party in every polling district should bestir themselves and see to it that the gathering is large and representative.

representative. If all do their duty the men chosen will be York's next representatives in the Legislature.

The Woodstock Press, the personal organ of Mr. B. F. Smith, says: "The opposition party has called a provincial convention in St. John on Thursday of this week when the resignation of Hon. James Murray, leader of the opposition, will be presented, giving valid reasons why he wishes to retire. He will be succeeded by Hon. J. B. M. Baxter of St. John or Hon. B. F. Smith of Carleton."

Hon. Dr. Smith ex-Minister of Lands and Mines declares in an interview with The Mail that the statement published by the opposition press that he differed with his colleagues over the stumpage rate, was manufactured out of whole cloth. He says that the \$5 rate was fixed by the Government on his recommendation after a careful enquiry into conditions prevailing in the lumber trade.

The territorial revenue of the province during the last year of the old government amounted to \$544,000. Hon. Dr. Smith, who was the Minister in charge of the Department up to a few days ago, informs The Mail that he expects the \$1,500,000 mark to be passed this year. The old government used to collect sixty per cent of the stumpage; the present government collects the full amount.

The dissolution of the Legislature seems to have found the opponents of the government in a state of unpreparedness. They have yet to hold a convention, select a leader, lay down a policy and make the necessary financial arrangements for the support of certain newspapers of their own party. It is certainly not a very rosy outlook.

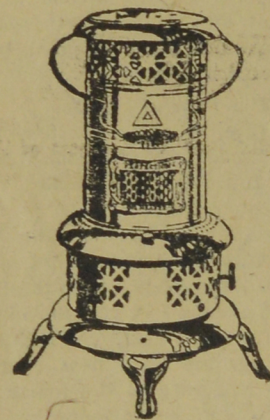

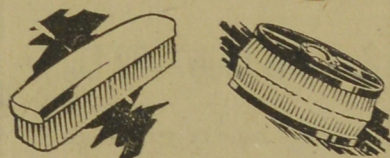

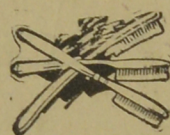
