CHAMBERS OF COMMERCE FOR IMPERIAL PREFERENCE

Resolution was Adopted by a Large Majority—A Sharp Discussion on Free Trade and Protection Took Place—Sir George E. Foster Welcomed the Delegates on Behalf of the Government—An Important Gathering.

Toronto, Sept. 21—After a spirited discussion on the question of free trade versus protection, the Congress of the Chambers of Commerce of the Empire, today passed a resolution in favor of imperial preference, by a vote of eighty-three to twenty-one. A. Barton Kent of London Eng., said: "It was not till a tariff was imposed that we became great. It was not till Germany imposed a tariff that she became great."

Sir George Foster, who said he came as a listener, welcomed the Congress in the name of the government, and said he hoped it would prove a milestone in imperial progress. "Don't let us be doctrinaires," said he. "What may have been good one time may be a bad policy today. We favor the principle of protection, but the grade must vary from time to time as we are called upon internationally. It is folly to say England is wedded to free trade neither it nor protection came from heaven. While we as a government believe in protection our policies must in the future be judged at the bar of practical expedient. We must give ourselves a wider range of action. We have to look to all classes of the nation and so moderate our laws. I believe we can develop a trade and its communication entirely independent of every other empire."

Wants Free Trade.

T. L. Moorehouse of Huddersfield, who opposed the resolution advocated absolute free trade within the empire. Scoring the results of protection in Canada, he said it cost him twice as much to eat in Ontario as it did in England; a tie cost him three times as much here.

"At tariff of any kind causes the manufacturers to increase the cost of their commodities," he said, "and bolsters up special interests. We must buy in the cheapest markets and cut production costs down and any preference would increase the cost of living in England. For the last five years we have had practical protection and are sick of it. We are tired of United States methods for neither these methods nor their products are satisfactory." He declared that the prosperity of Great Britain was built on a free trade foundation.

A. Lambert of Montreal favored a preferential tariff. "Cheapness was not the only object to attain and opportunity of employment was more to be desired," was the opinion of Oliver Bedington of the British Board of Trade in Paris.

Differential Duty.

Venezuela's thirty per cent. differential duty on produce and merchan-

dise imported into Venezuela from the British West Indian colonies, was denounced by the Congress on the motion of Geddes Grant of Trinidad.

A resolution in favor of an imperial trade propaganda moved by H. L. Symonds, of London, England, was carried unanimously. Mr. Symonds urged that facilities of commerce should be established in the various universities of the empire.

Stanley Machin, J. P., London, England in a resolution which was carried pleaded for employment for former service men. Mr. Machin said that 153,000 former service men in England were drawing unemployment pay pay, and 33,000 of them had registered as willing to go to the British dominions. "And forty per cent of these are anxious to come to Canada," Mr. Machin said.

He added that he had been told by a Toronto manufacturer that he would give employment to twenty-five of these men. This statement was greeted with applause.

"The Anglo-Saxon sometimes blunders, but he has never been intimidated," said a message from New York Chamber of Commerce to the congress, acknowledging the empire business men's greeting to New York after the Wall street explosion.

New York's message, signed by D. P. Kingsley, president of the chamber of commerce, told the British congress that New York had answered the challenge of the Reds with a complete resumption of business within twenty-four hours.

Mr. Kingsley's telegram was read to this morning's session of the congress by Lord Desborough, the chairman. It was greeted with applause.

The establishment of an "empire bank" whose functions would be to act as the banker of governments and banks, with a central office in London, England, and branches throughout the empire, was the suggestion made at today's session of the congress of chambers of commerce of the empire, by John Darling, C. B. E., of London, England. Mr. Darling advocated in this connection the general issue of comparatively short term bills of exchange against goods in transit, as a method of standardizing the currency.

"If," said Mr. Darling, "we can so arrange the empire's exchanges that it becomes in effect a united economic whole, endeavoring as far as possible to supply its own wants and on balance to repay the debt to America (United States) the advantages to all parts of the British empire will be considerable."

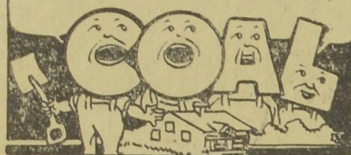
