BILL TO AMEND ELECTION ACT WAS DEALT WITH

Under Its Provisions Copies of the Voters' Lists Must be Forwarded to the Provincial Secretary-Treasurer—An Interesting Discussion in the Local Legislature on Matters Pertaining to Elections in This Province.

A bill to amend the Elections Act was considered by the Legislature in Committee on Thursday.

It provides that in future copies of voters' lists be forwarded to the Provincial Secretary-Treasurer, whereas under the old act they are only forwarded to County Secretaries.

Hon. Mr. Byrne said that copies of the lists were kept on file at Ottawa and he thought it would be in the public interests to have a copy in the hands of the Provincial Secretary-Treasurer. The question of having the lists printed by the Government had not been considered.

Mr. Baxter said he had his own views in regard to the election law, but they had not prevailed with his colleagues when he occupied a seat on the other side of the House. He had proposed that Revisors be named by candidates of each party and a third by the Governor-in-Council.

Mr. Burchill—How would that work out with four parties?

Mr. Baxter said that he thought the difficulty could be got over in some way. He thought it might be a good plan when sending the lists to the Provincial Secretary-Treasurer to also send copies to the candidates who represented each party at the previous election. His idea was that the lists should be available for both parties.

Hon. Mr. Byrne said that the bill had not been introduced with any attention of taking a political advantage. It was deemed advisable to have a complete list on file in the office of the Provincial Secretary.

Hon. Mr. Foster thought two copies might be filed so that one could be available for each political party.

Mr. McGrath—What would become of the independent?
Hon. Mr. Byrne said that copies of the lists could now be obtained upon application to the County Secretary. Candidates of either party or their agents could get them on payment or a fee, so the bill offered no political advantage.

Mr. Baxter said that while the lists could be obtained there was sometimes delay in getting them which might be overcome if an extra copy was in the hands of the Provincial Secretary.

Mr. Michaud thought it might be well to defer action until they found out if provincial lists were to be adopted in the new franchise act at Ottawa. Under the old act printed copies could be obtained from the Federal Government. That privilege might be abolished in which case it might be advisable for the Provincial Secretary to print the lists and supply them to candidates for a small fee.

Hon. Mr. Byrne said he had no objection to the section standing over for further consideration.

Hon. Mr. Foster said he could assure his hon. friend from St. John County that there was no political advantage to be gained from the bill. It might be arranged to have two copies filed with the Provincial Secretary-Treasurer, so that one would be available for the opposition party.

Mr. Tilley said that two sessions ago he had submitted to the hon. premier some proposed amendments to the Election Act, but had since heard nothing from them. One of his suggestions was that the agents of each party should be required to submit

a sworn statement showing the amounts expended on an election.

Hon. Mr. Byrne said that the Election Act was consolidated by his hon. friend opposite in 1916, and the hon. member should then brought forward his amendment. He felt that any effort to eliminate bribery and corruption in elections was deserving of encouragement, and he would be glad to receive any suggestions along that line.

Hon. Mr. Foster said he believed that electrol lists should be printed and made available to candidates, but he had hesitated to adopt that plan on account of the great expense it involved.

Progress was reported on the bill.
