



The tax falls heaviest on bachelors and diminishing proportionally according to the number of children in a family.

A yearly tax is placed on furnishings of houses worth more than 10,000 francs, the tax ranging from 2 to 25 per cent, according to the value of such furniture.

In the case of the family tax, a deduction of 500 francs is dlowed for each of the first two children in such family, and 1919, 143. Wind mileage, 6,251. Wind February 1919 the lowest temperature 1,000 francs for each additional child.
