

## CHANGES IN THE CRIMINAL CODE

Ottawa, May 28.—Further amendments to the criminal code, submitted by Hon. Mr. Doherty, in the house of Commons, extend the number of kinds of fire arms, the carrying of which is forbidden; they provide for increasing the age of consent; they make it an offense for an unauthorized person to wear military or naval uniforms; they provide that a summons issued in one province for the appearance of a person in another shall be issued only under the authorization of the attorney-general of the province in which the summons is issued, and they provide for more severe penalties for keeping disorderly houses. In regard to the last named, a third offense must be punishable by imprisonment whether the person is the same or not.

It is proposed to amend section 300 for the purpose of making a person convicted of attempted rape liable to whipping. Such punishment may now be administered in convictions for indecent assault, and several judges have called attention to the anomaly in that similar sentence may not be passed for the graver offence.

Cleveland Ohio May 29.—Cleveland's housing congestion is one of the causes of a divorce suit recently filed in Common Pleas Court.

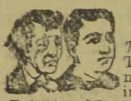

## TRIBUTE TO LATE DAVID BROWN

(St. Croix Courier).

A distinguished son of Charlotte county, entered into rest during the week, in the death of David W. Brown which occurred at his home in Dover, Delaware, on Thursday last, after an illness of several months, following a stroke of paralysis.

Mr. Brown was the third son of the late Hon. James Brown of Tower Hill at one time a member of the government of New Brunswick, and one of a family of seven of whom only one now survives, Mrs. John McKenzie of Rumford Falls Me.

With his brothers, John C. Gillmor and Wilnot he studied civil engineering and became well known in his profession, being concerned in the work of the construction of the Shore Line, the Kent Northern, the International, the Joggins and other roads in the provinces, and with the Dexter and Piscataquis, Rumford Falls, Rangely and other roads in Maine. He stood high in his profession and his services were always in demand. Of a cheerful and kindly disposition he made friends readily and was esteemed for his many excellent qualities.

Mr. Brown is survived by his wife, who was Miss Alice Burton Abbot of St. Stephen, daughter of the late P. M. Abbot, in his day a prominent lumberman, and by three sons, Lieut-Col J. Carleton Brown, D. S. O., R. E. of the British army, who has been on service in the east during and since the civil war, and who arrived in New York from Constantinople just too late to see his father in life; John and Daniel in Dover, and two daughters, Misses Vera and Carolyn. The deceased gentleman was a most kindly and considerate husband and father, and in their great sorrow the family have the sympathy of all.

The remains are to arrive here today, for interment and will be accompanied by his sons, J. Carleton and John W. The funeral will be from the residence of the Misses Abbot on Prince William street at 2.30 this afternoon.

## MADE BIG SUM IN LOTTERY

New York, May 29.—The happiest man aboard the Spanish Royal Mail liner Princess de Satriestegui, in from Havana and on her way to Spain, is Capt. Juan Llanes pilot of the port of Matanzas for the last twenty years. His reasons for jubilation are several. First, he says, there is his wife, next his twelve children ranging in years from four to twenty and finally the \$100,000 he won recently in a grand lottery. He is going on a visit to his old home in Barcelona, which he has not seen in 38 years, since he left to go to sea.

Florida Gerez, representing a wine company near Seville, is returning to Spain by the Spanish liner with an order from Cuban dealers for 3,000 barrels and 500,000 cases of bottled wine. He says Cuba is consuming four times as much wine as she did before America went dry, partly because of the influx of American tourists and partly because of the great prosperity in Cuba that inspires the prosperous to celebrate with more frequency than in the past.

## PROFITEERING IN SUGAR

Ottawa, May 28.—The sale of sugar in an Ottawa grocery at 36 cents per pound will be investigated by the Board of Commerce through all its stages. Gosselin and Durocher, the merchants who sold the sugar last Tuesday to a returned soldier named J. Gale testified before the board today that they were informed that day by a wholesaler's traveler that sugar prices had advanced. They raised the price on stocks on hand from 22 to 30 cents and the sale at 36 cents which is complained of was afterwards adjusted, the 36 cents price having been charged by mistake.

The hearing will continue next Tuesday. If necessary, sittings of the board will be held in every province in which this consignment of sugar was handled from refiner to consumer, to establish chairman O'Connor stated, why sugar was sold "at this outrageous price."

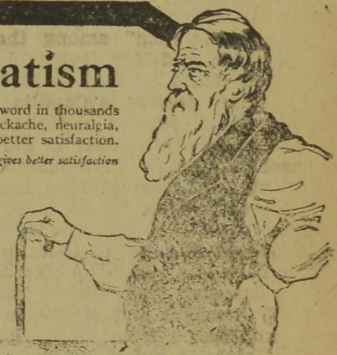
