When Hagen, the crack American golfer, came over to take part in our open championship, he drove some 600 golf balls spectacularly into the sea-just for practise. When he arrived, he gave the Deal course what he would term the "once over", told the nearest Press man he guessed he 'could do four 73's", and offered to take odds of 10 to 1 against himself winning the championship!

The American is a good loser and—more important—always a good winner. "Bill" Tilden, the all-conquering tennis champion who has just beaten so easily all our own heat is trained. so easily all our own best, is typical in this respect. When our 'Varsity in this respect. The American boxing man's method of "fighting with his tongue" is, of course, indefensible, but it is not quite so objectionable when one understands the Americans. It is when one comes to baseball that it is most difficult to get the American point of view which is so alien to all our notions of fair play.
