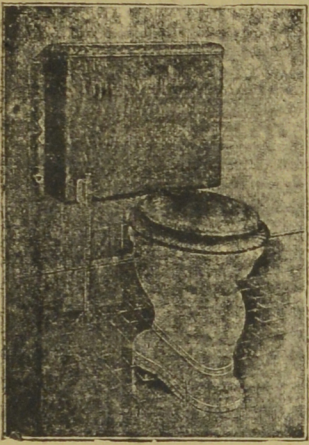

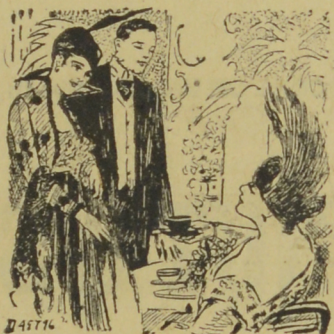

THE FOSTER GOVERNMENT
HAS A SPLENDID RECORD

The Affairs of the Province Have Been Conducted in a Business Like Way—Has Given the People a New Pride in Their Province—The Administration Has Successfully Grappled With Many Big Problems.

(Moncton Transcript)

The Foster Government goes to the Country with a record of which its supporters have some reason to be proud. Mr. Foster promised that his administration would conduct the business of the province in a business like manner and that promise has been kept. In the line of positive achievement the government has much of first importance for the progress of the province to its credit; the premier's review of the activities of his administration justifies a new pride in our province.

The Government had much to make up. When it came to power the very foundations of public policy were in disorder; the financial system was so operated that, as the St. John Standard now cynically admits it was nigh impossible for the general public to get a correct view of the financial position of the province. It found a huge deficit which had been carried over from year to year, and an extraordinary system of converting public property into so-called party funds. It found the province lamentably backward in economic and social legislation as compared with some of the other provinces. It found a highway policy, devised for political purposes which had left the roads and bridges in a condition decidedly unsatisfactory. It found that the important question of vocational training had received no practical attention beyond some meagre provision for agricultural instruction, though other provinces had gone ahead and developed educational facilities which had exercised a marked influence upon their industrial and commercial progress. It found a workmen's Compensation Act, which while of value to

the workers was not indifferent to the interest of the lawyers, in that it favored litigation, about the last thing an injured worker or his dependents wanted. It found a Crown Land's policy under which lumber operators were held up for party contributions, and the lawful claims of the public treasury ignored. It found a large number of big problems on its hands, some arising out of conditions created by the war, and most rendered more acute because of failure to make any provision to deal with them in the past.

In the circumstances the success which has attended the Foster government's efforts to give the province the appurtenances of modern progress is really surprising. New Brunswick has gone ahead in public well-doing; it is no longer the backward bad boy of Confederation. A new spirit is abroad in the land; a refreshing optimism born of things accomplished and the assurance of greater achievements in future. The Government need not claim credit for all this new self-confidence so essential for the progress of the province. Its chief merit has probably been its capacity to reflect the new spirit of the people, the determination and energy with which it has tried to translate their hopes and aspirations into practical realities. Nevertheless the spirit and character of the Government has been an asset of great importance; its progressive and business-like attitude to public affairs, has blazed a trail through the jungle of graft and maladministration which was the legacy of the old government, brought order out of disorder, and set New Brunswick in some respects in the van of the other provinces.

A HALIFAX NEWSPAPER PRAISES
THE FOSTER GOVERNMENT

Replaced an Administration Which Had Brought Shame and Disgrace Upon the Fair Name of New Brunswick — Has Re-established Public Confidence and the Prestige of the Province Has Been Enhanced.

(Halifax Chronicle.)

The Provincial Elections which are to be held in New Brunswick on October 9th, will give the electors of that Province the opportunity, of which they no doubt will gladly avail themselves, of expressing their approval of the conduct and record of the Foster Government during its short but very successful term in office. The return of the Liberals to power at the last General Election, in 1917, in the sister Province, was hailed with the utmost satisfaction by all the friends of good government throughout the Dominion. The record of their predecessors in office not only brought shame and disgrace upon New Brunswick; it was deplored by Canadians everywhere. It revealed a very sad state of affairs indeed in connection with the Government of the Province. The half, however, had not been told, and the subsequent investigations conducted by the Foster Government resulted in a series of exposures, which shocked the public conscience. Happily, however, the unsavory mess has been cleaned up, and that dark chapter in the history of New Brunswick, let us hope, is closed forever.

An Energetic Leader.

Under the able and energetic leadership of Hon. W. E. Foster, the reputation of New Brunswick has been restored, public confidence has been re-established, and the prestige of the Province has been enhanced at home and abroad. The Government appears to have dealt wisely and progressively with the public services of the Province. It has encouraged agriculture, it has taken adequate measures for the safe-guarding and conservation of its very valuable timber resources, and has made substantial progress in the direction of highway improvement. It has also been alert and progressive when dealing with matters touching the social and industrial well-being of the people; it has created a Workmen's Compensation Board, and established a Department of Public Health.

In the address which Premier Fos-

ter has submitted to the electors he outlines a forward looking programme which should appeal to the enlightened people of that Province and generally aid in the development of its resources, and the encouragement of industries, and contribute largely to the social welfare of the whole people.

Did Not Seek Office.

New Brunswick has done well under the administration of its present Government. Its Prime Minister, Hon. W. E. Foster, did not seek the office. He responded to the call after the last General Election, largely as a matter of public duty, and though he entered upon his responsible task without experience in public life, we believe it is the general testimony that he has done more than well. He has not been showy or spectacular in his methods, but he has measured up admirably to the responsibilities of his position and he has impressed the country as a straightforward, public-spirited, competent leader who is jealous of the good name and honor of his Province, and is eager to promote its interests by sane and enterprise administration of its public affairs. Premier Foster has proved himself a worthy leader in the new era of public life in New Brunswick, and it is unthinkable that the electors of that Province will fail to give a handsome verdict of approval of his Government's record of well-doing.

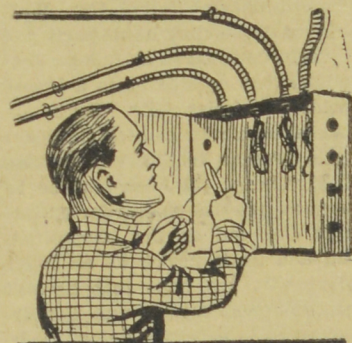
