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GETTING INTO LINE

Successful Government Conventions were held yesterday in the Counties of Kings, Madawaska, Sunbury and Albert and strong candidates were placed in the field in support of the Foster administration. Other conventions are to be held immediately and it is expected that by the early part of next week there will be strong candidates in the field in every constituency ready to do battle for the administration.

Mr. J. E. Michaud, who has represented Madawaska since 1917 will stand for reelection and will have for a colleague Mr. D. L. Daigle. Hon. L. A. Dugal, who has represented the county since 1912 is retiring from public life on account of pressure of private business. An honorable and conscientious man, he has rendered yeoman service to his party and friends of the government all over the province will learn of his retirement with feelings of the deepest regret.

In the County of Kings the Government ticket will be composed of Col. O. W. Wetmore, Mr. Sterling Keith and Mr. Erley Harnor. This is an exceptionally strong combination and should have no difficulty in redeeming this fine count.

In Westmorland the friends of the government in convention at Moncton have selected Messrs Fred Magee, F. E. Bourgeois, F. L. Estabrooks and Reid McManus. Mr. Magee is one of the strongest and most popular men in provincial public life, and with the excellent colleagues chosen to run with him will have no difficulty in holding the noble county for the government.

In Albert the friends of the Government have selected as their candidates Messrs J. W. Steeves of Elgin and Arthur A. Stevens of Hillsboro. Both men are new to public life, but they are well qualified for the duties of representatives and stand an excellent chance of redeeming the constituency. In the last election Albert County gave a small majority against Premier Foster's party but the excellent record made by the Government will be pretty certain to bring about a change.

In Sunbury the friends of the government unanimously selected the present representatives Messrs R. B. Smith and D. W. Mersereau and their election by substantial majorities is a foregone conclusion.

The government is appealing to the people on its splendid administrative record and is assured of a hearty support in every county in the province. Its return to power by a greatly increased majority is assured.

A NEW LEADER

At a provincial opposition convention in St. John yesterday Hon. J. A. Murray, retired from the position of leader of the forelorn hope opposition

and was succeeded by Dr. J. B. M. Baxter, who has been his chief lieutenant during the past three and one half years. The position was offered to Col. F. B. Black of Sackville who declined with thanks and Dr. Baxter being the only one of prominence who could be found to step into the gap, he was tendered the honor and accepted it. Dr. Baxter has represented St. John county in the House since 1912, and for a time held the position of Attorney General in the Government which was ignominiously kicked out of office in 1917. He is a lawyer of ability, but owing to an ungovernable temper he does not enjoy any large measure of popularity with the rank and file of the party. He has the reputation of being a political trickster and has in the past usually lived up to his reputation. Dr. Baxter is the father of the present Intoxicating Liquor Act, but any measure of credit which might be due him for that, was somewhat offset by his action, under party pressure, in subsequently standing in the House that certain features of the act were too drastic and not calculated to promote the cause of temperance.

The change in the opposition leadership from Murray to Baxter will scarcely be the means of restoring public confidence. Dr. Baxter was a member of the government which brought disgrace upon the province. Evidence taken by Royal Commissions shows that he knew all about the crooked work in connection with the Valley Railway and patriotic potations transactions, and he did his level best to conceal the details stood by his friends, but the people of this province do not want as leader of the government, a man who will condone wrongdoing merely for the sake of keeping his friends in office. The people of the province expected the opposition to clean house but it has not done so. This will no doubt be the deciding factor for thousands of people when they go to the polls on October 9th.

The friends of the Provincial Government in Sunbury at a great convention at Burton yesterday unanimously nominated Messrs. R. B. Smith and D. W. Mersereau, the present representatives as their candidates for the Legislative Assembly. Messrs. Smith and Mersereau have rendered the County faithful service and if the people of the constituency are alive to their best interests they will send them back by thumping majorities. Mr. Smith is the largest employer of labor in the County while Mr. Mersereau carries on extensive farming operations. They make a splendid team and will command hearty support in every section of the County.

The announcement that Hon. B. F. Smith has broke clear of his party and will run in Carleton as an Independent Candidate has created quite a breeze in political circles. Mr. Smith is known as a clever political trickster but his present tactics will deceive nobody. Shrewd politician that he is, he sees no possible chance for reelection in Carleton on the Opposition ticket, and he is posing as an Independent with the hope that he will obtain sufficient farmer and Conservative votes to ensure his election. In other words he is going to try to work the "every man for himself" game.

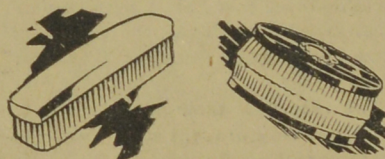

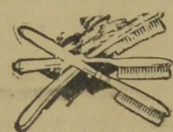
