## SEPTEMBER MEET ENDED WITH SOME GREAT RACING AND SOME UPSETS FOR THE BETTING TALENT

Brage, Favorite in the 2.18, Got Only Fourth Money, the Race Going to Tommy Cotter After Six Heats—Zom Q. Won the Free-for-All, Although Lady Grattan was Favored—Quidnessett Won 2.21 in Straight Heats.

The Fredericton September Harness Meet is now a matter of history and the last day saw some great racing and the largest attendance of the meet. Quidnessett won the 2.21 and that was according to form but the wins in the other two classes were not. In the Free-for-all for which some hundreds of people came miles to see, the dope was upset badly Zom Q. winning after Fern Hal captured two heats. Lady Grattan was the favorite but didn't show much class dividing third and fourth money with Peter Farren. The 2.18 required six heats to decide the winner. Four horses took a heat each in this class before a horse could win a second heat. Tommy Cotter, ignored in the pools, won the race. Brage was the favorite but got only fourth money.

#### The 2.21 Mixed Class

Quidnessett won the 2.21 in straight heats. The only feature was the distancing of Kyo Todd in the first heat. Driver Gerow did not take kindly to the flag and being given permission to go an exhibition mile covered the distance in 2.15 flat. The time by quarters was, 33, 1.06 1/2, 1.41, 2.15.

#### Free-for-All

The Free for All gave the talent a great upset. Lady Grattan was favored to win and in the pools was coupled with Peter Farren against the other two. Fern Hal and Zom Q. made the better showing, Zom Q. winning the race after Fern Hal had taken two heats. The Sussex mare was in great form but failed to last more than two heats. In the third she was passed on the turn by Zom Q. In the fifth with but two starters she broke badly after trailing Zom Q. more than half a mile. The purchase of Archie Alcorn divided third and fourth money with Peter Farren.

#### 2.18 Trot and Pace

Six heats were required in the 2.18 Tommy Raymond with Tommy Cotter redeemed himself from the bad odor in which he was Wednesday. Seldom is a race cut up as much as this was in the first four heats. Tommy Cotter College Swift, Brage and Bravos each took a heat. Then Tommy Cotter which had been breaking badly, went out and won the next two heats. Brage as going well in the fourth but could not keep up the pace, both Bravos and College Swift passing him on the second lap. Nearing the wire he broke badly.

St. John Telegraph: The deed to the Shamrock grounds is now at city hall and only the certificate of the city engineer regarding certain measurements of the land is necessary to have purchase, ordered on July 6, completed. The purchase price of the property was \$7,000 and the city fathers intended at the time to use the area for street development, playground extension and as a site for various entertainments. (Fredericton baseball and football teams have played on the Shamrock Grounds for years.
