PLUM CONSERVE.

Pit the plums and put them into the preserving kettle with a very little water, allowing one pound of sugar for every pound of pitted plums. Cook until thick (merely simmering for about 20 minutes) then add one-half pound of chopped English walnuts for each pound of plums that were put into the kettle at the beginning. Boil for five minutes more stirring constantly, and seal in sterilized jars.

ANOTHER PLUM CONSERVE.

Take three pounds of blue and red plums and an equal weight of sugar. Cut the plums in pieces, add a little water, the sugar, one-third pound of raisins, and the pulp of two oranges. Simmer slowly for one hour. Seal in sterilized jars.

GRAPE CATSUP.

Wash and stem 5 pounds of ripe grapes. Put into a kettle with one pint of water and let them melt down, then simmer until they are cooked. Strain through a puree-sieve and add one pint of vinegar, one-half teaspoon salt and one teaspoon each of cinnamon, cloves, allspice and pepper. Boil until slightly thickened, then bottle, cork and seal.

SWEET TOMATO PICKLE.

Let stand over night six large onions pared and cut into small pieces, one peck of green tomatoes sliced, and a sprinkling of salt. In the morning drain and add two quarts of water and one quart of vinegar; boil for 15 minutes, drain (throw away this vinegar and water), and add to the pickles two pounds granulated sugar, two quarts of fresh vinegar, and one tablespoon of mixed whole spices (these come together in a package and can be had from most grocers). Boil this mixture for 15 minutes more, and put either into a stone jar or seal in quart size preserving jars.

GREEN CORN OMELET.

Score the kernels of cooked green corn lengthwise, and with the dull edge of the knife press out the pulp. Remove the seeds and partitions from a sweet green pepper, cut into small pieces and cook until tender in one tablespoon of butter. Add two cups of corn pulp with two tablespoons of cream, season with salt and stir until thoroughly heated. Beat four eggs until light add four tablespoons of cream and season with pepper and salt. Melt 1 tablespoon of butter in an omelet pan, pour in the egg, cook over a hot fire until firm, lifting the edges to allow the uncooked portion to run underneath, sprinkle with 1 spoonful of the corn mixture, fold over, turn on a heated platter and surround with the remainder of the corn.

CREAMED SALMON WITH RICE.

One cup rice, 1 quart milk, 1 small can salmon, 1 can peas, 1 cup water; boil 1 cup rice in 1 cup of water until water is absorbed, then add three cups milk. Cook one hour. Cream small can of salmon with the other cup of milk and season well. Drain water from can of peas add ½ teaspoon sugar, ½ teaspoon salt and large tablespoon of butter. Heat thoroughly. Arrange rice in a tall mound in centre of a large platter; pour creamed salmon over it and place peas around the edge. I serve banana fritters with lemon sauce for dessert when we have this dinner.

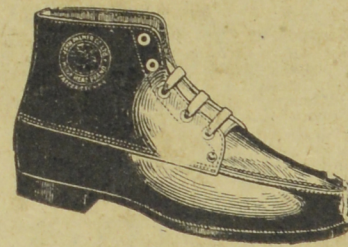

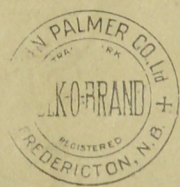
