## POLICE OF NEW YORK ROUNDING UP GUNMEN

Recent Hold Ups and Robberies Have Greatly Stirred the Popu-  
lace—Men Caught Prowling Around at Night Must Give an  
Account of Themselves — Another Robbery and Murder  
Reported in the Metropolis.

New York, Dec. 20—"Raids by po-  
lice fall to stop crime wave."

Thus read headlines in New York  
newspapers tonight after what was  
described as the first day of "the  
most sweeping round-up of crooks in  
this history of New York."

During the day amid numerous  
minor robberies which were listed on  
the police records, there was another  
murder by gunmen, who invaded the  
Seamen's Mission on the waterfront  
and shot and killed one man while  
stealing \$400.

At roll call in police stations this  
afternoon were read two orders that  
indicated Commissioner Enright in-  
tended to push the round-up to the  
limit. The first command was for pa-  
trolmen to stop and question all pe-  
destrians found between midnight and  
dawn on unfrequented streets and if  
actions arouse suspicion, to search  
them for firearms.

The second order revoked permis-  
sion for policemen to take half an  
hour for meals while on duty.

Revocation of the meal hour permis-  
sion came after the board of estima-  
tes had postponed until tomorrow  
further consideration of a request by  
Commissioner Enright for nearly 800  
more uniformed members of his force.

Meanwhile criminal courts cleared  
their calendars for action against ro-  
bber bands. All cases against burglars  
and highwaymen were advanced, and  
heavy penalties inflicted in cases

where a verdict of guilty was return-  
ed.

### Citizens Take Action.

While the municipal authorities  
were preparing to launch their offi-  
cial offensive on the underworld, the  
American Legion, merchants' associa-  
tions and other bodies met to lay  
plans of their own.

New York posts of the War Vet-  
erans' Association, after their ses-  
sion, dispatched a letter to Mayor  
Hylan offering him "the services of  
from 500 to 5,000 selected members of  
the legion to reinforce the regularly  
constituted police force of Greater  
New York at such a time as you as  
the chief executive of the city and re-  
sponsible for the maintenance of law  
and order, may determine that their  
service are required."

"This offer is made recognizing  
the responsibility of the individual  
members of legion as citizens and  
does not contemplate offering the as-  
sembly of the legion in connection  
with any matter involving industrial  
disputes" added the letter.

Steps taken in other cities to  
check crime waves were discussed at  
a meeting of the Merchants' Associa-  
tion which appointed a committee to  
study the situation in New York.
