

THREE TYPES OF NEGLIGES.

So numerous are the types of negligees that it is well-nigh impossible to divide them into well defined classifications but, roughly speaking, one group may be classified as informal and youthful sort of things, and in this list we find the breakfast coats. The second group are a cross betwixt and between the informal and the formal, and the third allow of being worn even in public and are ornate and very often trousered. All three types are interesting and remarkably varied in detail.

THE WELL DRESSED CHILD.

A child should feel comfortable in its clothes, and be neither too finely nor too plainly dressed. One is vulgar and the other unnecessary. Any one can find tasteful clothes for prices not far from reasonable, even now.

One cannot repeat too often that simplicity of line and color should be considered first, second, and all the time in the making of clothes for the young. Not that brilliant shades should be set aside, but they should be used as something sufficiently ornamental in itself. And not to be confused by extra adornment. Lace and white muslin may be intricately combined, but too many lines, too much fussiness is to be deplored.

KEEPING BABY COMFORTABLE.

The most convenient bed for baby is a bassinet. This may be as simple or as elaborate as desired. A very good one may be made from an oval clothes basket which should be about three feet in length. The sides may be covered with dainty white material and trimmed according to the taste of the mother.

The inside may be padded and fitted with a removal mattress. A rather large pillow will answer although later a hair mattress is more desirable.

The bassinet should not be allowed to stand on the floor as there is danger of drafts. It may be placed on one or two chairs and then can be moved easily. This bed will answer for baby until he is six or eight months old.

Keep the baby quiet and comfortable. Give him a little water to drink sometimes. Don't overfeed. Give him an airing out of doors every fine day, and put him to sleep in a sunny, well ventilated room. Don't excite him by showing him off to visitors. Let him sleep several hours every day. As soon as he is old enough insist on strict obedience. Don't give him what he cries for, when it isn't good for him. In short don't spoil your baby or you will have trouble later on.



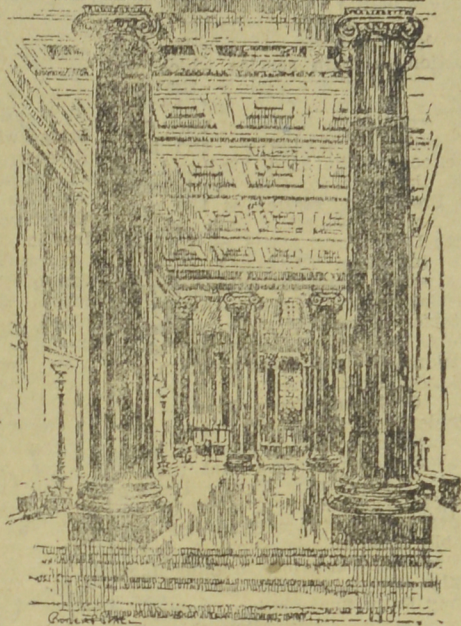

KISSES OF VAMP SHOULD
BE RULED OFF THE REEL

Superintendent of the International Reform Bureau is Going to Reform the Unguided Portion of the American Youth --- The Sacred Kiss and the Infamous Kiss Defined---Vamps Must be Excluded.

Washington, D. C., Dec. 20—The Rev. Dr. Wilbur F. Crafts, superintendent of the International Reform Bureau, Inc., is going forth to reform that unguided portion of American youth which is tempted after seeing a movie to go out and shoot up a town or rob a bank; those persons in the United States Canada and Mexico who persist in long distance betting on the races those who are thirsty enough to drink liquor that is taken out of bonded warehouses and those in China who take morphia if they are able to get it.

Dr. Crafts said so today at the headquarters of the International Reform Bureau, Inc., a building set comfortably near the Capitol, away from the influences of vice. Anybody who has any other idea about what the International Reform Bureau, Inc., is trying to do has it entirely wrong. There is no movement on foot, the Rev. Dr. Crafts averred, to close up movies on Sunday or any other day, except so far as the District of Columbia is concerned. There the "blue law" Sunday closing is to stop, at least for the present.

The hands of the International Reform Bureau, Inc., are full with its effort to put through during the present year the specific corrections as they apply to the United States, Canada Mexico and China. The blue laws of the District of Columbia is a side line entirely.

Four Reforms This Year

The four reforms that constitute the year's programme are:

1. Federal censorship for the movies
2. The prevention of the smuggling of morphine from America into China.
3. The interstate and international transmission of bets between Canada and Mexico and the several States as applied to the races.

4. The removal of the whiskey stock of the country from something like 400 bonded warehouses and its deposit in about six bonded warehouses where it is less likely to be stolen.

Soaring above all the other great issues is that of the movies in America, in the mind of the Rev. Dr. Crafts. The worst feature of the silver screen is the kissing, kissing by vampires, unholy, unwholesome kissing that can be traced to much of the laxity in the

morals of those who go to the movies. To those who sit in the dark and watch a vamp kiss somebody important out of a million or so there is the greatest peril. The time was when the evil was not so great, but now the thing is different. The rough element that used to hang out in the barroom is going to the movies and there, inspired by the wily camps, makes prey of unsuspecting women of tender age. Statistics of everything bad that has happened as a direct result are in the course of preparation.

Two Kinds of Kisses

There are two kinds of kisses the Rev. Dr. Crafts has decided after considerable study. First there is the sacred kiss, which is far too sacred to be portrayed on the screen. Then there is the infamous kiss, which is far too infamous to be pictured. Those are the kisses of the vamp. Those are the sort that should be ruled out of the reel.

"Our idea is to have the motion pictures regulated just like the banks and the railroads," the reformers explained. "We want to have a board of censorship that will correspond to the United States Supreme Court. I believe there should be a membership of at least seven men of the highest character, men who could command a salary of \$4,000 a year. I would then have boards of deputies in various cities and make it possible for appeals to be taken to the higher authority. State censorship of the movies has proved inadequate.

"Most motion pictures are improper. The evils are twofold. They depict crime, a thing responsible for many robberies and murders, and they play up their sex appeal, which has its evils among those of more mature age.

NO PEACE YET
IN IRELAND

London, Dec. 19—Father O'Flanagan vice president of the Sinn Fein who has been in correspondence with the British prime minister regarding a truce in Ireland has replied to Mr. Lloyd George's latest message in which the prime minister regretted that the door had been closed. "to those counsels of goodwill which you invoked at the beginning of this correspondence."

In his rejoinder Father O'Flanagan says that reconciliation is only possible when accredited representatives of "both nations meet as equals."

Premier Lloyd George had written previously: "I had hoped that with moderation and common sense on both sides it might have been possible to reach an understanding which would put a stop to strife in Ireland and pave the way to a reconciliation. You now imply in your judgment the only road to peace is the recognition of an Irish republic and the negotiation of a treaty with some one you designate as the official head and president of that republic."

"I have never failed to make it clear that there is no possibility of a settlement so long as the Sinn Fein demands an Irish republic."
