LOWER SHOE PRICES FOR 1921 PREDICTED

Washington, May 28—Lower shoe prices late next Winter and Spring were predicted by Edward A. Brand, secretary of the Tanners' Council of the United States, testifying before a Senate committee of inquiry.

Tanners and manufacturers believe prices will fall by that time. Mr. Brand said because of the recent decline in leather prices. This decline could not sooner be reflected in shoe costs, he said, because shoes are made up far in advance of the season in which they are offered on the market.

Mr. Brand said he did not believe that the "big five" packers controlled hide and leather prices. Altogether the packer product, he said, is only about 60 per cent of the total.

WOODSTOCK TRACK HAS GREAT ARRAY OF HORSES TRAINING FOR HARNESS-RACING OF 1920

Jimmie Gallagher Has Five in His String—Presque Isle and Houlton Stables Located There—Large Number of Locally Owned Horses Also at the Track.

Woodstock this season is one of the great training centres of the Maritime Provinces. As far as harness-racing is concerned. The Press of that town has the following:—

The prospects for horse racing here this summer are excellent. Horsemen have been working out their steeds on the track since May 1st, and the condition of the race course is first class.

Already 14 horses are quartered in the splendid stables at the fair grounds. These include seven out of town horses. Pope McKinnon, formerly of Bangor, will have two here today, Dusty Dan, pacer, 2:09 1/4 and Bertin trotter, 2:18 1/4. Bud Tingley of Houlton, is bringing The Problem, 2:04 1/2 on a mile track; Bud will likely have several more on his string. It is also reported that Bill Sharon 2:16 1/4, the fast colt trotter, will train here. This horse is now owned by Archie Alcorn of Blackville, Northumberland county.

The Hartland Driving Club has purchased a green trotter Colorado Rose by Colorado E. This mare will probably train here.

J. A. Dewitt of Presque Isle, is training here and has five on his string so far. Old Glory 2:22 1/4, Peggy Hal pacer, two fine green colts by the Northern Man, and Cassie W. pacer, owned by Murray McLeod of Hartland.

The one and only Jimmie Gallagher, has five in his string this year. Money Man, pacer, 2:18 1/4, Myrtle Rysdick, 2:22 1/4, Sis Peters, pacer, Togo M. and College Swift, pacer.

Henry Dewitt is training three Baron Marque, pacer 2:08 1/2 on mile track, Lady Bell owned by C. P. Dewitt, Hartland, and Belle McGregor, pacer, 2:10 1/4, owned by H. Dewitt.

J. P. MORGAN OFFERS HOUSE TO NATION

Washington, May 28—President Wilson has transmitted to Congress, without recommendation, an offer of J. Pierpont Morgan of the gift of his London residence as an American Embassy building. Mr. Morgan asked for prompt decision by the Government, saying that he did not want a residence to stand unoccupied while there was such scarcity of housing in London.

The chances are that Mr. Morgan's offer will be refused because of the invariable precedent that any person receiving the thanks of Congress is entitled for life to privileges of the Senate floor. It would be rather crude to accept the gift without thanking Mr. Morgan for it.

MOVIES LURED GIRL ACROSS THE CONTINENT

New York, May 27—After having travelled 3000 miles to become a movie star, Henrietta Bulte fourteen year old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Louis Bulte of 116 East 116th Street, yesterday arrived from Los Angeles in charge of a representative of the Bureau of Missing Persons and was returned to her parents in the office of Acting Captain John Ayres at the Headquarters. The girl had been missing since April 12. She was located by the New York Bureau May 17 two hours after she had obtained employment as a child's nurse with a family in Hollywood Cal.

Henrietta admitted that she was glad to be back and was anxious to go home, but she hopes to persuade her father to give up his tobacco business here and move to Los Angeles which she says is just the place for a girl with motion picture ambitions.

Worked Four Days as Nurse

When she left here on April 12, with out any one's knowledge she had \$265 in her purse, money her father had asked her to draw from the bank. Henrietta has \$500 of her own in bank, and she considers that she is entitled to half the sum for a trip to establish her in her desired profession. She had \$18 left when she returned and tells how she travelled from Chicago to Needles Cal., where she worked four days as a waitress in the Harvey System restaurant without having to pay fare.

She told her story to Capt. Ayres in the presence of Mrs. Bulte who has tened to Police Headquarters as soon as she found that Henrietta had arrived at 2 p. m. in company with Mary E. Hamilton, policewoman who went to Philadelphia to bring the girl back.

Capt. Ayres says that the department had checked up every hour of her time in the six weeks that have lapsed since she left home. Henrietta said that after four days in Philadelphia she went to Chicago and remained at the Y. W. C. A. until April 30, when she took a position with the Harvey Restaurant System and was sent by that organization to Needles on the border between southern California and Arizona. Henrietta's ability to speak fluent Spanish her parents' native tongue, helped her to that position.

"I'm Going Back," She Insists.

She worked there four days but disliking to wait on table she got on board a train bound for Los Angeles arriving there May 9, where until May 17 she stopped at a boarding house with some girls she had met at Needles. On May 17 she took a position as child's nurse with a family living at Hollywood the centre of motion picture activities and two hours later she was taken into custody by a representative of the Bureau of Missing Persons, which, Capt. Ayres says had been on her track ever since she left Chicago.

From May 17 to May 20 the girl appeared at various Childrens Society and Juvenile Court proceedings and left Los Angeles with the bureau's representative and a matron of the Santa Fe Railroad the morning of the 20th. At Chicago a matron of the Pennsylvania Railroad relieved the Santa Fe matron.

"I'm going back and take father with me," the girl said to the reporters. "And I'm going to be a movie actress in spite of everything."

Concerning the Wilde-Wallace bout in Toronto the Globe of that City says.

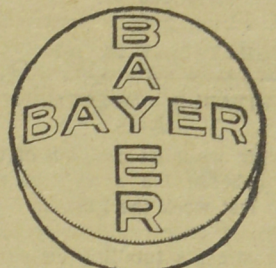
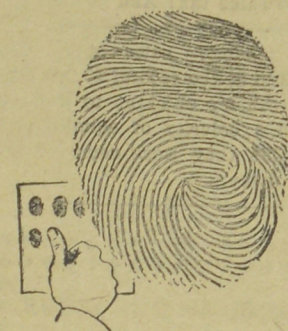

Ceremonies that formerly brought \$10 are now going at \$8, while \$5 events may be wedding-marched to the tune of \$4.

Seeing an opportunity to aid those who have been speared by Cupid, the Rev. J. J. Messler, of the First Methodist Church, of Bridgeton, N. J., has announced the cut in wedding fees.

But Mr. Messler believes in being fair and reasonable in his matrimonial economics. The bridegroom who hands out a dollar or so for heart wedding cannot expect any consideration.

The clergyman's general plan is given in the following announcement, issued today.

"Owing to the high cost of living I desire to give notice that a liberal discount of 20 per cent will be given to all parties seeking to be joined in the bonds of matrimony, provided the fee justifies the giving of such a liberal discount.

"Of course I have no regular fee," said Mr. Messler today. "I leave it to the discretion of the bridegroom. The man who counted on giving me \$10 would be justified in handing me \$8 and other amounts in proportion. The \$2 saved would buy a couple pounds of butter and a few dozen eggs."

Buckwheat Cakes

2 cups buckwheat flour
1 cup flour
4 teaspoons Royal Baking Powder
1 1/2 cups milk
1/2 cup molasses
1 tablespoon shortening
Sift together flours, baking powder and salt; add liquid, molasses and melted shortening; beat three minutes. Bake on hot greased griddle.

Waffles

2 cups flour
